OBITUARY

Mary Tucker was born in Thurlby, Lincolnshire, England, June 29, 1822, and died at her home in Cresco, Ia., Nov. 15, 1915. On July 4, 1849, she was united in marriage to Joseph Ridlington, of Cowbit, Lincolnshire, the Rev. Samuel Wesley, a third cousin of John Wesley, performing the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Ridlington sailed for America in April, 1851, and settled in Ohio on what was then known as the western reserve. Three years later they came farther west and spent three years at Davenport, when Mr. Ridlington began his work in the ministry, in which they continued until 1866, when Mr. Ridlington's health became impaired and he retired from the active work of the ministry. At this time they moved to Cresco where since they lived and wrought in the local church until Mr. Ridlington's death on November 20th, 1910. Since that time Sister Ridlington's health has been somewhat shattered, and her loneliness and grief, and some physical breaking down marked her for the grave. She realized the end was near and repeated over and over again, "Why can't I go, why can't I go?" She had remarkable consciousness almost to the very last. Mrs. Ridlington had no immediate relatives in this country, though a niece of her husband has been beside her bed the latter part of her sickness; her own family all live in England. A large number of friends and neighbors will greatly miss from their midst one whom they had learned to appreciate and to love.

Funeral was conducted from the home in charge of her pastor, Rev. Will Kirwin, of the Methodist Church, with the sermon by Rev. John Gammons, a former pastor, and interment was made at Oak Lawn Cemetery.

Jennie Arnold was born in Ireland, Jan. 11, 1836. Here her early life was spent and in the impressionable years of young womanhood she united with the Presbyterian Church.

When a young lady she sailed for the United States and settled in Wisconsin. A few years later she was married to Wm. W. Miles on Sept. 29, 1862, at Janesville, Wis., by the Rev. W. Lawrence. Immediately after marriage they moved to Iowa and located at New Oregon, later to Howard Center. Here they lived until 1867 when they moved to their farm in Saratoga Twp. Here the greater part of their married life was spent. About 19 years ago they retired from the farm and came to the village of Saratoga surrounded by their children and friends.

To Mr. and Mrs. Miles seven sons were born, Jesse, Fred, William, Alfred, Bert, John and Emmett, all but two survive her. Emmett died in infancy and Fred was called from this world July 29, 1909.

She was always a home loving woman, kind to her neighbors, always ready to lend a hand in the time of need for trouble. For the past five years she has been an invalid, being cared for by her husband, son Bert and his faithful wife. She was confined to her bed only during the past week when "The Author and Finisher" of all called her unto himself, Saturday, Nov. 13, 1915, at 4:00 p. m.

She leaves to mourn her going her husband, five sons, six daughter-in-laws, sixteen grandchildren and three great grandchildren together with a host of friends.

The funeral services was conducted by Rev. C. W. Hempstead from the Union Church on Monday afternoon, Nov. 15, 1915, and the remains were laid to rest in the Saratoga cemetery.

Tornado at Waucoma.

A tornado struck Waucoma at 2 o'clock last Thursday morning, demolishing St. Mary's Catholic Church, and doing other damage in the city and southwest amounting to more than \$100,000. No one was injured.

The storm came without warning and the damage was done so quickly that few people realized the gravity of the situation until all danger had passed.

The Catholic school building was unroofed and practically wrecked, the priest's residence was moved from its foundation and partially wrecked, the front of Roberts & Baier's dray barn was demolished and scores of residences, barns and other buildings in the city and country to the southwest were more or less damaged.

The church destroyed, which was one of the finest in this part of the state was valued at about \$25,000. There has been no estimate placed on the damage done to the school building, the priest's residence or the many other buildings damaged, but it is said the damage will total considerably more than \$100,000.

Mrs. Malek Dies Suddenly.


