Paving Third Avenue East from the West line of Sixth Street East to the West line of Eighth Street East and First Avenue West from the West line of Second Street West to the East line of Third Street West, with seven inch Portland cement concrete pavement, consisting of a five inch foundation and a two inch top course; about 3800 sq. yards of paving, more or less, work to begin on or before August 15th, 1916, and to be fully completed on or before October 15th, 1916.

So much of the cost of the construction of the said improvement as is by law assessable against the abutting and adjacent property to be assessed against said abutting and adjacent property in accordance with the law governing the same, except that the City will pay for street intersections, and payment to the amount of such assessment for such work will be made in assessment certificates, bearing interest at 6 per cent. per annum. In case of any deficiency between the contract price and the amount of such certificates, such deficiency will be paid in warrants drawn on the improvement fund. Said assessment certificates and warrants shall be accepted by the contractor in full payment for all work done under his contract. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check, in a separate envelope, said check to be drawn on some bank in Cresco, and made payable to the order of the city treasurer of the City of Cresco, Iowa, and endorsed with the name of the bidder and the improvement such check and proposal are for. Certified checks accompanying proposals will be returned to the unsuccessful bidders when the contract has been awarded, and also to the bidder to whom the contract is awarded when he shall have entered into contract for the construction of said improvement with the City of Cresco and given bond in the sum of \$2500.00, with sureties to be approved by the City Council of the City of Cresco, for the faithful performance of his contract. The contract will contain a provision that the contractor shall guarantee the improvement to remain in good repair for the period of three years from and after the date of its acceptance by the city, and the bond will contain a like condition. In case the successful bidder shall fail to enter into contract with the City of Cresco for the construction of said improvement or furnish bond as herein required, and as required by law, the certified check deposited by him with his bid shall be forfeited to the City of Cresco as agreed and liquidated damages.
