Cholera killed 476,712 hogs in Iowa in 1915.
 John Holm, aged 14, of Jewell, is missing.
 A \$30,000 armory will be erected at Keokuk.
 Mary Jane Graham, aged 93, of Atlantic, is dead.
 Carl Jones, aged 9, of Ft. Dodge, was killed by an auto.
 James Jones, aged 8, was killed by an auto at Ft. Dodge.
 A life saving station will be installed at Ft. Madison.
 Ed Denman, a well digger, was drowned at Des Moines.
 Lucy Selby, aged 6, of Berwick, died from infantile paralysis.
 Wm. H. Reece, aged 60, of Ottumwa, was drowned near Eldon.
 Bernard F. Cornwall of Sioux City was drowned at Hawarden.
 There has been five deaths from the heat at Dubuque this season.
 Mayor George W. Kooz of Iowa City was overcome by the heat.
 Six persons were injured at Ottumwa when an auto turned turtle.
 David Fisher, Sr., prominent independence man, died from apoplexy.
 A store building at Scranton was destroyed by fire causing heavy loss.
 The rebuilding of \$40,000 worth of bridges was begun near McGregor.
 Eric Quax, aged 25, near Garden City, was killed in an auto accident.
 Ed Williams, of Moorehead, was drowned in Blue Lake, near Onawa.
 Waterloo will raise \$1,000 monthly for relief of National Guard families.
 Miss Agnes Heaps, aged 17, of Boone, was drowned while swimming.
 Mrs. Lois Page of Lenox was fined \$1,600 for burning her husband's barn.
 Harvey Chansky was drowned at Iowa City on the eve of his 21st birthday.
 A man named Thorson, near St. Ansgar, was instantly killed by lightning.
 Dorothy Gillin, a small girl at Sioux City, was a victim of infantile paralysis.
 The amount paid for hunting licenses in Chickasaw county in 1915 was \$1,208.
 James Hutchinson, of Perry, was seriously injured when he fell down stairs.
 Several freight and passenger trains were seized at Sioux City by I. W. W. gangs.
 Floyd Smith, aged 21, was drowned in the Maquoketa river near Manchester.
 Camp Dodge is now deserted except for a few regular army officers and orderlies.
 Anna Danielson of Harcourt died near Seattle, Wash., while on her wedding trip.
 Six artesian wells are now opened at Ft. Dodge, one of these being 1,900 feet deep.
 About two-thirds of the crops in the vicinity of Bancroft were ruined by a hail storm.
 Mrs. O'Connor, a widow at Eagle Grove, was struck and instantly killed by an auto.
 L. I. Thomas, Illinois Central brakeman, was stabbed to death by a fellow workman.
 James Love, aged 63, dropped dead at Waterloo, while planning a picnic with his wife.
 A bold robber at Burlington entered a street car and grabbed the fare box containing \$25.
 An auto at Ft. Dodge struck and demolished a baby buggy, but left the baby uninjured.
 Geo. L. Holt, a farmer near Altoona, was killed when struck by a street car at Des Moines.
 Mrs. Henry Brau of Oakville was painfully injured by an infuriated cow, while milking.
 Frank Wackernagel, of Clearfield, was badly bitten by a snake while working in a field.
 August Trittlen, near Marshalltown, was terribly injured when he fell on the tines of a pitchfork.
 Flames destroyed the large barn at a monastery near Dubuque, and 250 tons of hay were burned.
 Two daughters of Mrs. Fred Hupt, aged 9 and 15, were killed when an auto turned turtle at Manning.
 Roy Anker, aged 25, of Des Moines, was killed between two cars on the Great Western at Des Moines.
 William C. Bishop, aged 39, of Council Bluffs, died from blood poisoning, after cutting his finger with a saw.
 Dr. Gable, a physician at New Albin, was killed near Waukon, when his auto plunged over an embankment.
 Junk dealers at Sioux City are charged with encouraging children to steal in order to get articles to sell.
 Dr. F. L. Vandevor of Cedar Falls ran into an Illinois Central train with his auto and escaped without injury.
 Mrs. E. Schlamp, an aged woman near Lansing, was seriously injured by a flying splinter, while chopping wood.
 Ora Duncan of Ft. Dodge was electrocuted when he came in contact with a short circuit wire at the Ft. Dodge creamery.
 Miss Flora Dunlap, president of Iowa Women's Suffrage party, will leave Iowa for settlement work in Brooklyn, N. Y.
 When Warren Folk, aged 45, of Humboldt, walked into the road to save a chicken, he was struck and killed by an auto.
 P. E. Black, aged 30, and Hazel Black, aged 16, cousins at Ft. Madison, were apprehended while eloping, and returned by the police.
 Hugh Barris, of Iowa City, has sued Dr. Frank C. Titzen of Iowa University for \$30,000, claiming a tube was left in his body after an operation.

 Half a dozen fires occurred in Kelly as a result of crossed wires.

 The postoffice at Calumet was robbed of \$250 in cash and stamps.
 Katherine Hede, aged 16, was drowned at Fraser while swimming.
 Thieves stole 300 fine young chickens from Thomas Perry, near Perry.
 Wm. Taylor of Centerville was badly injured when he fell from a haymow.
 Osie Severson, near Osage, died after being thrown from a load of hay.
 Three Holstein cows were sold from the Mount Pleasant hospital for \$2,900.
 Charles Bacchus was killed by his step-son, Frank Henzen, at Davenport.
 L. B. Lee, near Columbus, was badly bitten by a muskrat while shocking oats.
 Mrs. William Wilkins, one of the oldest pioneers of New Hampton, is dead.
 James Braden, aged 20, of Carson, is dead from the dread disease trichinosis.
 Arthur Harms, aged 2, of Yorktown, was run over and badly injured by a horse.
 The assembly tent at the Central City chautauqua was flooded with water.
 Warren Folk, retired farmer of Humboldt, was killed when run down by an auto.
 Rev. J. T. Marvin, former pastor of the Congregational church at Iowa City, is dead.
 J. W. Stockman, merchant at Burlington, fell from a scaffolding and broke his hip.
 A well 3,021 feet deep was recently completed at Stuart. It is the deepest hole in Iowa soil.
 E. G. Stone of Logan raised on the average of \$1,100 worth of strawberries from an acre.
 Kurt Teichmann, aged 21, formerly of Ft. Dodge, died in the trenches with the German army.
 The silo and barn of M. L. Maxwell, near Creston, was destroyed by fire at a loss of \$2,000.
 The body of Miss Myrtle Foster, drowned near Muscatine, was found in the Mississippi river.
 Many soft drink dealers were taken into custody at Keokuk charged with illegal sale of liquor.
 Cullum & Jeffries, horse dealers at Centerville, have shipped 1,400 mules during the past year.
 Two farmers, Geo. Frauer and Rudolph Reissen, near Walcott, were prostrated by the heat.
 Miss Francis McDougall has returned to her home at Charlton, after being held as a spy in Egypt.
 Burt Ross was arrested in Ft. Madison and 1 1/2 pounds of opium and a pipe were found in his grip.
 Lieutenant R. E. Phinney, formerly of Iowa City, has been promoted to a captaincy in the U. S. army.
 Albert Nelson of Ft. Dodge was seriously hurt when a truck containing five tons of stucco ran over him.
 Russell Findley, aged 3, of Stanwood, is dead after being thrown through the wind shield of an auto.
 Geo. Mikish, and sister Sarah, of Pocahontas, were injured when their motorcycle collided with an auto.
 Ed Meyers, farm hand near Church, was injured when he walked out of a second story window in his sleep.
 Men from the Ford factory were in Sioux City looking for a favorable site for a new branch assembling plant.
 Ray Potter, junior at Iowa University, now serving in the European armies, was wounded in the trenches.
 Ft. Madison's mayor ordered all lights to be turned out to forestall the attack of huge swarms of mormon flies.
 Dr. C. H. Koon, veterinary surgeon of Kingsley, was badly burned when he upset a can of lye which got into his eyes.
 Farmers near Council Bluffs find it profitable to haul hogs in auto trucks since the Iowa Short Line has ceased operation.
 Two boy scouts, Paul Robinson and Raphael Stringer, of Edgewood, saved a small boy from drowning, using first aid methods.
 Miss Wilber Jones of Webster City, a bride since last December, was shot and instantly killed by her 12-year old brother-in-law.
 Minnie A. Vincent of Ottumwa instructed her two children to watch her, then took poison and died before they could reach her side.
 A large Buick car at Ft. Dodge leaped through the plate glass window of the Thompson clothing store. The occupants were uninjured.
 Mrs. Allen Freidburg of Charles City was greatly surprised when her brother whom she thought had been dead for 25 years, came to visit her.
 Harry Cowles, aged 21, after surviving nine months in the trenches with the English army, was seriously injured while diving in shallow water near Claremont.
 Charlie and Billie Richards, aged 10 and 8, were drowned at Des Moines while their little sister, aged 6, sat on the bank for two hours wondering why they did not come to get her.
