ROOT MAKES PREDICTIONS
Believes Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs Will Follow Romanoffs.
New York, March 27.—Ellihu Root, in a message read at a mass meeting to celebrate the success of the Russian revolution, predicted that the Hohenzollerns and Hapsburgs would follow the Romanoffs.

"The admirable selfcontrol which the new Russian government and their followers have exhibited is the supreme test of a people's capacity for selfgovernment," said Mr. Root. "This wonderful change in Russia is part of the mighty and, I believe, irresistible movement of the whole world to substitute democracy for autocracy."

TAFT SPEAKS AT MEMPHIS
Former President Opposes "Step Lightly" Policy.
Memphis, Tenn., March 27.—Former President Taft, in an address here in advocacy of the League to Enforce Peace, made a plea for a virile Americanism and gave emphasis to the declaration that the league would not stand for a "step lightly" policy.

Mr. Taft expressed the opinion that, "with the exception of a relatively few extremists," Germans who are citizens of the United States will prove their loyalty to this country.

+ RUSSIAN REPUBLIC IS ADVOCATED.
+ London.—The general central committee and the parliamentary representatives of the Constitutional Democratic party at Petrograd voted in favor of a republican form of government for Russia, according to a Petrograd dispatch. Professor Paul N. Milukoff, the foreign minister in the new government, is leader of this party.
