PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Cresco, Iowa, March 25, 1919

The Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, met pursuant to adjournment. The meeting was called to order by John F. Hale with the following members present: John F. Hale, Chairman, with Supervisors J. W. Wells and J. H. Watson; all members being present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and on motion approved.

IN THE MATTER OF DRAINAGE DISTRICT NO. 4, HOWARD COUNTY, IOWA.

RESOLUTION CONFIRMING ASSESSMENT OF BENEFITS.

AND NOW, to-wit: on this 25th day of March, 1919, it being the day heretofore set for the final hearing and consideration of the report of the Commissioners heretofore appointed to classify the lands within said Drainage District No. 4, and to make an equitable apportionment of the costs, expenses, costs of construction, damages and fees to be assessed against the lands and highways within said district in the manner and form as provided by law, the Board proceeded to hear and consider all objections made and filed, and

WHEREAS, it is hereby found and determined that all persons affected by said assessment have been served with notice of this hearing in the manner and form and within the time as provided by law, and that all things required to be done as by law required, and that this Board has jurisdiction of the subject matter and of all lands, persons and corporations affected thereby, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, that the classification and assessment made by said Commission as shown by the report on file in the Auditor's office is hereby approved, fixed and confirmed and there is hereby fixed and assessed upon the lands and highways within said Drainage District and benefited by said improvement the sum of Twenty-six Thousand Five Hundred Eight (\$26,508.00) Dollars, said sum being the estimated cost of the reclamation for said District upon the ratio and in the proportion as herein fixed and there is hereby levied and assessed against each tract of land and highway within said Drainage District the sum set opposite the description of each such tract of lands as set out in said Commissioner's report, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the special assessment upon each tract of land, and highway as herein levied and assessed shall bear interest not to exceed 6 per cent per annum from the adoption of this resolution until the same is paid.

This resolution to be in full force and effect from and after the date of adoption. On motion to adopt said resolution and roll call the vote was as follows:

Adopted this 25th day of March, 1919.

On motion duly seconded at 5 o'clock p. m. the Board adjourned to 8 o'clock a. m., March 26, 1919.

Second Day.

The Board met pursuant to adjournment with all members present.

IN THE MATTER OF DRAINAGE DISTRICT NO. 6, HOWARD COUNTY, IOWA.

This being the date and the hour for considering the bids for the construction of Drainage District No. 6, Howard County, Iowa, and

WHEREAS, the bid of the Hawkeye Construction Company of Webster City, Iowa, to furnish material and labor for the construction of said Drainage District No. 6, complete for the sum of Five Thousand Four Hundred Seventy and Three One Hundred (\$5,470.03) Dollars, is the lowest and best bid; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, that the bid of the Hawkeye Construction Company be, and is hereby accepted, and the Chairman and the Auditor be, and are hereby directed to enter into contract with the Hawkeye Construction Company for the construction of said Drainage District No. 6.

On motion and vote said resolution was adopted this 25th day of March 1919.

RESOLUTION DIVIDING VALUATION OF ASSESSMENT.

WHEREAS, Chas. Rohr, for the Standard Oil Company has petitioned the Board of Supervisors to make an equitable division of the 1918 assessment between the south half and the north half of Lot 8, Block 28, Cresco, Iowa, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, that it finds and determines that an equitable division of said assessment of Six Hundred Forty-four (\$644.00) Dollars is as follows: N $\frac{1}{2}$ \$420.00, and S $\frac{1}{2}$ \$224.00.

On motion duly seconded said resolution was adopted.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, that the petition of Roy J. River for a refund of \$47.92, on account of soldier's exemption, one half of the taxes on the SE $\frac{1}{4}$, Sec. 22-100-14, and the personal property assessed to C. L. River and Roy J. River, be and the same is hereby granted and the Auditor is hereby authorized to issue a refund warrant for same.

On motion duly seconded said resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION TO PAY FOR GRAVEL PIT.

WHEREAS, upon appeal by M. H.

Culbert to the District Court from the appraisal of damages awarded by the Sheriff's Commission appointed to appraise the damages sustained by M. H. Culbert to the East half of the Northwest Quarter of Section 34-99-100, by the taking of land on said premises for gravel pit by Howard County, the jury awarded One Thousand and Seventy-nine (\$1,079.00) Dollars in damages to M. H. Culbert by reason of taking such land, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Howard County, Iowa, that the Auditor be and he is hereby directed to issue a warrant on the County Road Fund to M. H. Culbert for One Thousand Seven hundred and Seventy-nine (\$1,079.00) Dollars, and deliver the same to the Sheriff to be held by him pending acceptance by the said M. H. Culbert.

On motion and vote said resolution was adopted.

On motion duly seconded at 5 o'clock p. m. the Board adjourned to 8 o'clock a. m., March 27, 1919.

On motion duly seconded the Auditor was instructed to advertise for four car loads of Oregon Fir Bridge Lumber; four car loads of piling and approximately 1744 lineal feet corrugated metal culverts, same to be on the specification of the County Engineer. Bids to be on file with the County Auditor April 17, 1919.
