Attention Census Enumerators!

Applicants for appointment as census enumerators should send their applications to I. W. Brunt, Supervisor of the Census, Decorah, Iowa, as soon as possible as the test or examination for these positions will be held the week beginning October 27th and including Saturday, November 1st.

The tests or examinations for enumerators will probably be held in the County Seat of each County in the District and possibly two or three other towns. The time and place for the examinations will be published a little later but no time should be lost in sending in the applications that an estimate of the number taking examinations may be made.

All applicants will be sent a circular regarding the duties, qualifications and compensation of the enumerators. Also, an official application blank, an illustrative example of the population schedule, circular regarding the test. Illustrative example of the agricultural schedule to be sent to applicants in the country districts only.

The official applications must be in the office of the Supervisor of the Census at Decorah on or before October 15th so that every applicant should immediately apply to the Supervisor for the necessary blanks.

The following are disqualified:—
 (a). A person less than eighteen or more than seventy years of age is disqualified.

(b). A person who is not a citizen of the United States is disqualified.

(c). A person who has been convicted of any crime is disqualified.

It is hoped that a large number of competent persons will apply. A census enumerator is desired for each Township and for each Ward in the larger towns.
