PEACE LEAGUE MAKES APPEAL

Calls On Senate To Forget Prejudice and Partisanship and Ratify Treaty.

PEOPLE WANT PEACE

Says Defeat of Ratification Received By Country With Surprise and Indignation.—Not a Party Question.

New York, Nov. 24.—Settlement of differences over the peace treaty to permit its ratification as soon as possible after the Senate reconvenes, is urged in a statement issued by the League to Enforce Peace, at the conclusion of a special meeting of the executive committee.

Former President William H. Taft, president of the league, presided. Among other things the statement says:

"The defeat of ratification has been received by the country with surprise and indignation. The people want peace. They want peace and they want a league of nations to guard the peace. Whose name it bears, which party brand it wears, they care not at all. They longed for and expected ratification before adjournment of the Senate.

"The making of peace is no more a party question than was the making of war. The American people, without regard to party, stood behind the war until the day of victory. With like unanimity they now stand behind the treaty.

"Shall the small minority who oppose a league of nations in any form defeat ratification? Shall fifteen senators decide where America shall stand in this world crisis? Eighty senators have shown by their votes that they favor the great principle of the league of nations. The fate of the treaty rests in their hands. They have the votes. They have the power. Theirs is the responsibility.

"The failure to ratify the peace treaty has encouraged social unrest both at home and abroad. Europe must have supplies or it will face starvation and anarchy this winter. Our farmers, cotton planters, live stock raisers and manufacturers have large surplus production which they can market only in Europe. The rates of exchange already demonstrate the collapse of any national credits. These credits, resting upon commerce and international securities, are the foundation of our continued prosperity and are vital to the maintenance of order and life in Europe.

"People's Will Supreme."

"Men and women of America, this is your problem. Your interests, your welfare, the honor and the future of your country are involved. Your will is the supreme command for the men in Washington entrusted by your votes with guiding the nation along the paths of peace and victory.

"The treaty should be ratified at the earliest possible moment after the Senate reconvenes, December 1. In the name of thousands of Americans who have died to bring peace and end war, and of millions of Americans who have toiled and sacrificed to that end, we call upon the Senate to forget prejudice and partisanship and agree upon a resolution of ratification couched in terms that will permit the other signatories of the treaty to acquiesce in the conditions of our ratification."

3 KILLED IN POSSE BATTLE.

Twelve Men Wounded in Pitched Fight in Louisiana Town. Bogalusa, La., Nov. 24.—Three white agitators, defending a Negro wanted as a race war leader, were killed and a dozen others wounded, one probably mortally, during a rifle and pistol battle here between the Negro's white protectors and members of the Law and Order league.

The battle started when the armed radicals, who had served as a bodyguard for a Negro accused of spreading I. W. W. propaganda for a battle between the races, refused to surrender the man to the posse, which had a warrant for his arrest.

Supreme Court Adjourns. Washington, Nov. 25.—The supreme court has adjourned until Dec. 8 without announcing any decision as to constitutionality of wartime prohibition or the legality of 2.75 per cent beer.

Plot Against Great Premier. Athens, Greece, Nov. 25.—A plot to assassinate Premier Venizelos and overthrow the monarchy has been discovered, and many arrests have been made by the authorities.

2,284 Sacks of Sugar Seized.

St. Louis, Nov. 24.—A libel was issued here by Assistant United States Attorney Wheeler for 2,284 sacks of sugar, containing 100 pounds, which is alleged to be held by a cold storage company for a local manufacturer and wholesaler of fruit preserves, sirups and soda water.
