FARM BUREAU NOTES.

Farm Bureau Workers Active.
Considerable interest is being shown in the Township meetings that are being conducted by the farm bureau. In spite of bad roads about one hundred farm bureau boosters turned out for the meeting at Elma last Saturday.

Test Association Pays.
That the cow testing associations help their members to increase the production of their herds has been definitely proved in a great many instances. Another bit of evidence appears this week in the report of the Monona-Farmersburg Cow Testing Association according to Ernest Linn, the tester.

The association there are seven herds which are testing for the second year. In these seven herds during the past month there were 20 cows that produced over 40 pounds of fat. Each of these herds had one or more of the 40 pound cows. Nineteen of the herds in the Monona-Farmersburg Association are testing for their first year. In these herds there were only ten cows that produced over 40 pounds of butterfat in the month and these ten cows were all in five of the nineteen herds. Thus the members who are testing for their second year all have cows producing 40 pounds or more of fat in a month, while fourteen of the herds testing for the first year had no 40 pound cows.

"While the number of cows entering into this illustration is not large enough to make it conclusive evidence, yet the indication is very plain that the cow testing associations tend to increase the production of the herds of the association members," says Mr. Linn.
