FARM DEPARTMENT.

Conducted by the Farm Bureau.

Orchard pruning and spraying demonstrations will be held on the farm of Dan Burnett northwest of Saratoga Friday morning, April 16, and on the farm occupied by F. A. Eckerman during the afternoon of the same day. Saturday morning a similar demonstration will be held on Otto Gesell's farm, four miles north of Elma. The Farm Bureau has arranged for experts to come and demonstrate the proper methods of pruning and spraying trees. Short talks on poultry raising will also be given and the women are especially invited for the poultry demonstration.

There have been numerous inquiries at the Farm Bureau office in regard to spraying. These demonstrations will afford an excellent opportunity for those who are interested in the subject to become acquainted with proper methods. One man near Cresco claims he made several hundred dollars by following the proper methods in spraying his fruit trees.

The township meetings conducted by the Farm Bureau during the past week have been for the most part exceptionally well attended. Mr. Pedersen of Blackhawk county and a farmer near Cedar Falls has given some very fine talks to the Farm Bureau members in this community. "Make use of your Farm Bureau" Mr. Pedersen said. "You will get out of it just what you put into it." He went on to show the importance of getting the boys and girls into the Pig Club and Calf Club work, the need of poultry culling and orchard spraying demonstrations, soil testing, cooperative buying and selling, cow testing associations, etc. He also explained the need of a good state and national farmers organization such as is being supplied through the farm bureau movement.
