

## Another Royal Suggestion GRIDDLE CAKES and WAFFLES

THERE is an art in making flapjack pancakes, griddle cakes or waffles, call them what you will. But it is an art very easily and quickly acquired if you follow the right recipes.

Here are some recipes for a variety of breakfast cakes that will make grandmother envious. The secret, of course, is Royal Baking Powder.

### Royal Hot Griddle Cakes

2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1 1/2 cups milk  
2 tablespoons shortening

Mix and sift dry ingredients; add milk and melted shortening; beat well. Bake on slightly greased hot griddle.

### Griddle Cakes with Eggs

1 1/2 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
2 eggs  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1 tablespoon shortening

Mix and sift dry ingredients; add beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening; mix well. Bake immediately on hot griddle.

### Buckwheat Cakes

2 cups buckwheat flour  
1 cup flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 1/2 cups milk or milk and water  
1 tablespoon molasses  
1 tablespoon shortening

Sift together flours, baking powder and salt; add liquid, molasses and melted shortening; beat three minutes. Bake on hot greased griddle.

### Waffles

2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups milk  
2 eggs  
1 tablespoon melted shortening

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together; add milk to yolks of eggs; mix thoroughly and add to dry ingredients; add melted shortening and mix in beaten whites of eggs. Bake in well greased hot waffle iron until brown. Serve hot with maple syrup. It should take about 1 1/2 minutes to bake each waffle.

### OBITUARY.

Wilson.

Stewart Wilson passed away on May 11, 1920, at the age of 73 years, 11 months, 11 days. He was born in St. Lawrence City, New York on May 20, 1846, of parents who were both natives of Ireland.

His boyhood days were spent in New York, his education being gained in that State in the rural school and at a private school there.

His parents moved to Vermont, he accompanying them.

In 1865, Mr. Wilson, then nineteen years of age purchased a fifty-acre tract of land in Wisconsin on which he lived until 1872. On the 25th Sept. 1872 he was united in marriage with Miss Mary Wilson of Fond du Lac, Wis. To their union were born two children, Frank Wilson of Cresco, and Nellie now Mrs. J. B. Rostrather of Minneapolis. In 1872 Mr. Stewart Wilson with his wife came to Howard County, Ia., purchasing a farm south of Cresco. They lived on that farm until 1903, when they moved into Cresco to enjoy a well deserved retirement.

Mr. Wilson held several minor trusts of honor in Cresco and in his home district. He leaves to mourn his death his devoted wife, his two children, John Wilson, of Cresco, six grandchildren.

The funeral services were held at his late home on Friday, May 14th, at 2:30 p. m. Rev. G. W. Turner, of Bonair, conducting the service in the absence of the Rev. Dr. Nye.

The pall bearers were: Michael Kratz, Thomas Gaskell, M. J. McArthur, H. G. Salisbury, Robt. Thomson, and Frank Farnsworth. Beautiful floral tributes were laid upon the casket which tributes were later photographed at the studio of Madam Blomquist-Sayre.

The funeral arrangements were ably carried out by E. L. Bradley of Cresco.

### Bishop

Horace Bishop passed away on Monday, May 10, 1920, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. E. O. White, in Cresco.

He was the eldest son of William and Elmira Bishop and was born in New York state on August 12th, 1831. On May 24, 1855, he was married to Mary C. Stover and came to Iowa in 1871, settling on a farm in Howard Center twp., where he lived for about 12 years. For quite a number of years he has lived in Cresco with Mrs. Bishop, who passed away about five years ago. He is survived by three daughters—Mrs. Hattie Webster of Milbank, S. D.; Mrs. Orpha Webster of Fort Collins, Colo.; Mrs. E. O. White of Cresco, and one son—A. V. Bishop of Springville, N. Y. The funeral services were held on

### FARM DEPARTMENT.

Conducted by the Farm Bureau.

Seven counties are to be surveyed for soil data this summer. They are Boone, Dallas, Dickinson, Dubuque, Emmet, Hardin and Mills. This work which is under the direction of the Iowa Agricultural Experiment station in co-operation with the bureau of soils of the Department of Agriculture, will start as soon as field conditions permit.

These surveys are made, explained P. E. Brown, in charge of the work for Iowa, to determine the kinds and areas of soils present in the county. A map is made of the territory showing the location of the soils, the exact location of all roads, railroads and water-sheds. This information is very valuable in figuring out drainage problems.

Samples of the soils are taken and sent to the station at Ames and tests are made to determine what may be done to improve the soils and increase crop production by adding lime, manures and other fertilizers, establishing drainage, and growing legumes.

This data is of great value to the farmers in determining what crops they can raise to the best advantage and how they may best grow. Up to date 33 counties have been surveyed and it is hoped to have all the work completed in a few years.

During the recent strike the Chicago Junction Railway Company issued an embargo and refused to accept shipments from other roads. This occasioned heavy feed bills, heavy shrinkage and some losses. Railroads are liable for such losses on shipments accepted and enroute when strikes occurred. It has been reported that certain railroads have provision in their contract which relieves them from liability for loss due to delay in transit. This clause is clearly invalid and clearly a contravention of the Cummins amendment which prohibits railroads from imposing any limitations on their liability for loss in shipments of live stock. Farm Bureau members can now take advantage of the railroad claim agent, who has been employed by the Farm Bureau Federation and whose headquarters are 464-465 Transportation Building, 608 South Dearborn St., Chicago.
