**Iverson.**

Sivert Iverson was born March 23rd, 1866 in Orleans two., Winneshiek Co., Ia., his father was Ole Iverson Halseth, and his mother, Gjertrude Dale Iverson. Sivert spent most of his life traveling. After an accident to his back, his health did not permit him to do very much hence he could not work on his farm in North Dakota, but rented that and took such jobs here and there as fit his strength.

He left home in 1898, and spent one year in Black Hills, S. D. Then he spent two years in Minneapolis. Later he located on a homestead near Rugby, N. D. He later made three trips to the Pacific coast. He spent seven years in the west. One year he lived in New Orleans, La. At the outbreak of the World War he was in Norway, Europe, on his way to Hammerfest, to see the Midnight Sun.

After various difficulties he managed to return to America and spent a winter in the Government service in New York city as a mechanic in a munition factory. Last winter he spent in Florida. This summer he was on his way to Glacier Park, but while at work in Minneapolis, he turned the nail on one of his fingers and blood poison set in which resulted in his death on July 30th. He spent his last weeks at the Lutheran Fairview hospital and received much comfort there from the visits of the Hospital Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Dahl.

Sivert Iverson leaves to mourn his departure his aged mother, Mrs. Gjertrude Iverson, who was 80 years in January last, his four brothers E. O. Iverson, Ben Iverson, Cresco, Ia., Carl, Balta, N. D., Anton, Minneapolis, and two sisters, Mrs. Geo. Benson, Cresco, Ia., Mrs. H. A. Hanson, Ogilvie, Minn.

Sivert was always cheerful. He had broad vision of life and appreciated the need of membership in the church. He was faithful to his church and kind to his mother.

Funeral services were held in Cresco Tuesday, Aug. 3rd. Rev. Normann spoke at the house in Norwegian and in Orleans church in English and Norwegian.

His many friends filled the church. His casket was covered with floral tributes.

A quartette from Cresco consisting of Mrs. E. H. Allen, Mrs. Millie Hermann, J. H. Burgess and F. D. Mead sang beautifully "Nearer My God to Thee" and "Abide With Me." Thus rests all that's mortal of a pilgrim on this life's pathway.


