TWAS NO LANDSLIDE

But an Avalanche of Ballots Covers the Democracy.

The election of Tuesday overwhelmingly favored the Republicans, Warren G. Harding being elected president by an electoral vote of 401 to 127 for Governor Cox.

In Iowa the entire Republican state ticket is elected by pluralities varying from 150,000 for Kendall for Governor to 300,000 for some of the state officers. Senator Cummins was elected by 200,000. The state is claimed for Harding by 400,000 pluralities.

The national election was a campaign of prejudice against principle, in which the latter was lost sight of and the administration made the target for vicious and untruthful attacks of every description.

National Democratic Chairman White accurately sized up the situation in a statement made the day after election. After conceding the election of Senator Harding, Mr. White said:

"The abandonment by some of the most prominent Republican leaders of the very League of Nations which they helped to construct has been successful. The people have succumbed to the confusion wrought by these distinguished men, and to the misrepresentation of those who would not and did not understand the League of Nations. I hope it may yet be rescued from the political morass and be saved to mankind."

"No one has any occasion for bitterness or of recrimination. What the whole people decide the whole people must accept. The Democratic national committee abides by the result cheerfully. If with foreboding, Senator Harding is the people's president."

"In the election Republican propaganda has been shrewdly directed to induce the descendants of six European nations instead of as one American nation. They have inveigled these Americans to vote with their thoughts across the sea instead of on this country. The common task must be to unite this group again."

The fate of Irish freedom has been settled adversely. They have endorsed. I am sad to say, a separate peace with Germany.

"For the first time in eight years a Republican party is face to face with the task of constructive legislation and more than that, the measures of reconstruction for which the country has been asking a Republican congress for two years in vain. They must change a negative record into a positive. And in this task they have the best wishes of all who love the country."

In Howard county the vote was surprisingly large. Cresco alone cast over 1500 votes, nearly one-half its total population. The usual Republican majorities in this county were augmented by the women's vote. The two county contests, for representative and sheriff, were both won by the Republicans, although Dodd for representative was defeated by his home vote had not the women's vote of Cresco saved the day for him.

Another Royal Suggestion

COOKIES and DROP CAKES

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

WHEN the children romp in hunger, here are some wholesome delights that will satisfy the most ravenous appetite.

Cookies

1/2 cup shortening
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup milk
2 eggs
1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
or grated rind of 1 lemon

Drop Cakes

4 cups flour
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
Cream shortening and sugar together; add milk to beaten eggs and beat again; add slowly to creamed shortening and sugar; add nutmeg and flavoring; add 2 cups flour sifted with baking powder; add enough more flour to make stiff dough. Roll out very thin on floured board; cut with cookie cutter, sprinkle with sugar, or put a raisin or a piece of English walnut in the center of each. Bake about 12 minutes in hot oven.

Cocoa Drop Cakes

4 tablespoons shortening
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 cups flour
3 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup cocoa
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream shortening; add sugar and well-beaten egg; beat well and add milk slowly; sift flour, baking powder, salt and cocoa into mixture; stir until smooth, add vanilla. Put one tablespoon of batter into each greased muffin tin and bake in moderate oven about 20 minutes. Cover with boiled icing.

MINISTERIAL MEETING.

District Pastors Meet at Ridgeway M. E. Church.

An interesting meeting of the ministers of the Charles City district of the Northwest Conference of the M. E. church was held at the Methodist church 2 miles west of Ridgeway, October 26 and 27. The meetings were in charge of the district superintendent, John H. Klaus, of Charles City. Fifteen ministers were present, but six could not be present. The papers read and the discussions were on subjects of greatest importance to the church at the present time.

The evening meetings were spiritual up lifts. On Tuesday evening, Rev. Greene, from Rudd, preached; on Wednesday evening Rev. Johnson, from Stitzer, Wis., preached a splendid sermon. On Wednesday afternoon Rev. Schukai, of Detroit, Mich., spoke on Child Welfare Work in Europe. The meeting closed on Wednesday evening after Rev. Hilmer, of McGregor, had preached a powerful sermon.

BLOODHOUNDS FIND CRIMINAL

Lukes, living in Winneshiek county, 2 miles east of Protivin has been annoyed for some time past by having his house entered when the family was away, and money and other things of value being taken. On Wednesday afternoon while his wife was away from the house for a time someone again entered the house. Mr. Lukes, acting upon advice given by Sheriff Ferrie, phoned to a Mr. Fox, of Oelwein, who has some blood hounds, to send them over. They arrived Thursday morning and Mr. Fox in company with the sheriff went to Mr. Lukes' home where the hounds immediately took up the trail, going directly to the home of a 17-year-old boy, who admitted his guilt and signed a sworn statement of confession. This is a matter which comes under the jurisdiction of the courts of Winneshiek county and will be turned over to the county attorney there for investigation and prosecution.
