

OBITUARY.

Pooler.

From the activities of a beautiful, useful life Mrs. C. A. Pooler was called home Sunday evening, Nov. 21. She had been in failing health for two years and seriously ill since the middle of last September. Death was due to Bright's disease.

Bina, daughter of John and Sarah Stochman was born in Clayton county, Iowa, May 14, 1855. When a child she moved with her parents to Wineshiek county, where she grew to womanhood. On April 26, 1874, she was married in the Congregational church at Cresco to Charles A. Pooler and the same year they came to Austin to reside and it has been their home continuously since. In 1876 she united with the Congregational church here and she has been loyal to its activities and interested in its prosperity ever since.

To Mr. and Mrs. Pooler were born four children—three sons and a daughter. Ray resides in Austin, Max in Hagerstown, Md., Dorothy lives at home and Clarence died in 1891. Besides husband and children Mrs. Pooler leaves three sisters, Mrs. R. W. Chamberlain of Marshalltown, Iowa, Mrs. Fred Brown and Mrs. Eugene Howard of Cresco, Iowa, also two brothers, Winfield and William Stockman, both of Cresco.

The funeral was held from her late home on Chatham street Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock with interment in Oakwood cemetery.

Mrs. Pooler needs no eulogy in Austin, where so many of the years of her life were spent and where she was known for the singular charity of her character. The lines of her life were clearly drawn and well rounded and she leaves the memory of a beautiful and completed life for those who loved her. Quiet and simple in her tastes, she was a devoted home maker and gave the best of her life to the comfort of her family. Her home was typical of what a home should be under the management of a skilled and zealous woman. Its orderliness, comfort and hospitality were known to all, but she found time for outside interests as well. She was a worker in the church and a promoter in all that pertained to its welfare. The Missionary society will miss her generous bounty, the Aid her friendly helping hand and the services her regular attendance. She was loyal to her friends and her home was often thrown open to their entertainment.

She was a good neighbor and a friend of all who needed friends. Sweet in her simplicity, strong in her quiet efficiency, Mrs. Pooler was a woman greatly beloved and in her death Austin sustains a distinct loss.—Austin Daily Herald.

Emma Sophia Mathews, youngest daughter of Robert and Ann Mathews, was born at the old home in Wagner township, Clayton county, Iowa, on Nov. 2, 1858, and died at her home near Cresco, Iowa, on November 26, 1920, aged 62 years and 18 days. On March 30, 1883, at Elkader, Iowa, she was united in marriage with William Brown and they made their home at Farmersburg and vicinity until eleven years ago, when they moved to their present home near Cresco, Iowa.

To this union two children were born, Genevieve, wife of Otto Fuelling, of Farmersburg, and Leslie of Cresco. To those who knew Mrs. Brown best, no words can possibly add anything to their knowledge and appreciation of her modest, unpretentious, sincere life, and they will feel the keenest loss at her going.

Her intense loyalty to her home and loved ones, her fidelity to her friends shown in speaking only of their good qualities, leaving the rest unsaid, were marked characteristics of her quiet life. Those who are left to cherish the memory of a loved one are her husband, daughter Genevieve, her son Leslie, two grandchildren, Kenneth and Winnifred Fuelling, a brother, James Mathews, and a sister, Mrs. Saacke, both of Farmersburg, Iowa, who were present at the funeral; one brother and three sisters having preceded her in death. Let us not say she has gone to her reward, but let us see in the sure knowledge she had of the lasting presence of God in the peace and power with which she met and bore life's burdens and the sweet and wise simplicity which made her so generally beloved, the true and eternal reward of the Christian life.

The funeral was held at the home Monday forenoon, conducted by Rev. Shoemaker, of Lime Springs, and the remains taken to Farmersburg for burial.

Morris

Mrs. Gershom Morris was born at Tanygrisian, Marionetshire, North Wales, March 19, 1848. Her parents were John W. Jones and Elizabeth Jones. She was one of seven children, of whom only two remain—Hugh Jones of York, Minnesota, and Mrs. Henry G. Morris of Minneapolis.

When twelve months old she immigrated with her parents to this country, making their home for a number

of years at Welsh Prairie, Wis. In 1896 she met with a sad loss through the death of her beloved mother.

In 1872 she came to York, Minn., making her home with her brother, Hugh Jones, until her marriage with Gershom Morris, which took place in January, 1873. Two boys and two girls were born of this very happy union. The daughters were called to their heavenly home, one in 1880 and one in 1882. In 1884 she met with another sorrow in the death of her beloved father, John W. Jones. After her marriage the family settled on their farm in York, living there until about ten years ago, when they moved to make their new home in this city. She had been ill for a long time and Saturday afternoon, Nov. 20, was called to her heavenly home.

Mrs. Morris' life and character were marked by many noble qualities of mind and hearts she was brought up in a religious home, was a faithful member of the church from her youth. During her life in York she was a member of the Bristol Grove Welsh church, and of the Welsh church of Lime Springs after the family moved here. She was also a member of the Dorcas Society and it can be said took a deep interest in the success of the good cause.

At home she guarded and labored for the best and highest interests of her family. As a neighbor she was social and kind, always anxious to do her part in seasons of sorrow and bereavement.

Her death is a great loss to the home, the church and the community. Her funeral, which was largely attended, took place Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 23. The husband, her two sons, Walter Morris and William Morris, a brother, a sister, and grandchildren, as well as all the relatives, have the sympathy of the community in their sad loss and sorrow.
