ISSUES OF THE CAMPAIGN.

The reason the present canvass has been marked by less than the usual interest and excitement attending national elections is because the Democratic leaders and committeemen have failed to excite the great body of that party with a promise of the offices.

The serious question presented is whether business shall be disturbed, labor threatened and capital imperiled by the agitation of a change of our customs or tariff laws. That issue is paramount in the minds of the people rather than the one of higher or lower duties.

In my judgment if the question could be submitted to the people of New York, "Shall the present tariff laws be further tested rather than subject us to another four years of the agitation of Mr. Cleveland's administration?" an affirmative answer would be returned with practical unanimity.

WHAT THE MCKINLEY LAW HAS DONE. The Morning, a London newspaper of large circulation, publishes in its issue of October 4th, a list of English firms that have moved their establishments to the United States because the McKinley law has made it impossible for them to manufacture for the American market in Great Britain.

Plush—Sir Titus Salt, Son & Co., limited manufacturers of silk plushes, from Saltaire, now located at Bridgeport, Conn. Employ about 200 people.

Hind & Harrison Plush Company, capital \$200,000, silk and cotton plush. From Bradford, now located at Clark's Mills, N. Y. Probably employ 200 to 300 people.

Lister & Sons, formerly of Bradford, manufacturers of plush goods, now in process of moving their plant to Jamestown, N. Y. Probably employ 200 people.

Shelly Manufacturing Company, manufacturers of imitation fur and plush, from England. Now located at Bemis, Mass. Probably employ twenty-five people.

Lace Curtains—Frank Wilkinson Manufacturing Co., from Nottingham, now located at Tariffville, Conn., manufacture lace curtains. Have a large business; probably employ 300 hands.

Saneraton Lace Curtain Manufacturing Company, formerly of Nottingham, now at Scranton, Pa. Probably employ 75 hands.

J. C. Atkin, formerly of Nottingham, now in the United States, lace curtains. Probably employ 75 hands.

Cleland, Campbell & Co., a Scotch firm, have completed their arrangements to locate their factory at Columbia, Pa., and are reported to employ 500.

Silk—Smith & Kaufman, from England, now located in New York city, manufacturers of dress goods; employ about 100 hands.

Pardoe Yates and Charles Marshall, representing a firm of carpet manufacturers of Wilton, Southampton, Manchester, closed in May, 1892, a contract with H. H. Isham, architect of Elizabeth, N. J., for the plans and erection of two factories, each to be 150x50 feet, three stories high, of brick.

William Roberts, of England, formerly manufacturing for American market, alpacas, mohairs, wools and worsteds, is now about to have three large buildings built in Begen county, N. J., at a point opposite Passaic.

Linen—Atcheson, Harding & Co., from Belfast have leased quarters in Passaic, N. J., to manufacture linen and cotton handkerchiefs; probably employ twenty-five hands.

Cotton Machinery—Ashworth Brothers, from Manchester, manufacturers of cotton machinery and card clothing, are building a factory in Fall River, Mass., which will probably employ 100 hands.

The Morning remarks that "the export trade of Great Britain is on the decline. The last returns show a decrease of 12 per cent. for the first seven months of this year as compared with the first seven months of the previous year."
