LOUISVILLE HORSE SHOW.

Magnificent Display of Fine Horses From Many States and Canada.

The Louisville Horse Show will begin on October 15th and continue for five days or evenings. There are nearly 500 entries in the various classes. The horses come from all parts of the United States, including two carloads from Canada.

The Horse Show Building, now complete, is well adapted to the needs of the Show, and it will accommodate 10,000 people. There will be a large attendance from abroad, and the various States will be represented by Honorary Vice-Presidents.

As this is the first indoor Horse Show ever attempted in Kentucky the interest taken in it by the home people is unusually large and the prospects are that Kentucky's reputation for fine horses will be definitely emphasized.

BRYAN ASSUMES FULL RESPONSIBILITY FOR GOEBELISM.

"Political parties are useful and necessary, but political parties must mean more than the piratical raid upon office. Political parties cannot sink fairness and honesty and themselves float. Political parties in a republic cannot exist by the enslavement of the people. When they attempt it they will be swept from the earth as timber before a conflagration. No party that ever was or ever shall be weighs a feather in the scale with the rights of the people to cast their vote and have them counted. We are woefully mistaken in the people of Kentucky if any party can live that identifies itself with Goebelism. The Legislature that has just died in ignominy has done all it could to send the Democratic party to the same dishonored grave.

"If the Democratic party, or Republican party, or the Populist party shall make the Goebel conspiracy its own, it brings upon itself its own destruction, or the people of Kentucky are no longer deserving of the right of self-government, which they will have surrendered; and that they have sunk to such depths of degradation the people of Kentucky nor the people of any other commonwealth in this union have yet given any sign."—Courier-Journal, March 16, 1898.

Saturday night Mr. Bryan, in his one address in Kentucky, said in conclusion: "Give us Beckham for Governor."

This is the last thing that remained in order to identify the Democratic party with Goebelism. Mr. Beckham was Speaker Beckham when the Goebel bill was passed. He was named by Goebel his candidate for Lieutenant Governor. He entered with Goebel in the contest to have the will of the people set aside and today is the beneficiary of that law, of that Music Hall convention, and of that contest. Beckham is in the full enjoyment of the stolen goods.

"Give us Beckham for Governor," says Mr. Bryan, himself a candidate for President.

That was an appeal to the people of Kentucky to accept the yoke of Goebelism, surrender the right to control public affairs. It is an appeal from Bryan to the disfranchised city to vote to indorse that disfranchisement. It was an appeal to our people to indorse all the jugglery going on at Frankfort, in a vain effort to confuse the issue and blind the people to all the crimes done in the name of the Democratic party.

This is the fourth time Mr. Bryan has come to Kentucky to throw his influence against honesty in politics, against popular rights, against the first principles of Democracy. This is the fourth time this gentleman—whose personal integrity is the boast of his friends—has come to Kentucky to countenance fraud and treachery; to promote theft, to counsel the betrayal of justice by unjust judges.

He stands as the defender of the worst crime committed in any State in the Union. He came last year to plead for Goebel. When Goebel was beaten, Bryan congratulated him upon his election. When he sought to drive honest men into dishonest paths to reach an office the law denied him, Bryan came to aid him in driving reluctant Democrats to that point of infamy. Now he comes once more to complete the circle of his own degradation. As he stood before that audience with uplifted hand, that hand was black with disgrace. His voice was the voice of Jacob pleading for Esau's birthright, and in the estimation of men who know what Democracy is, he fell like Lucifer, never to rise again.

When he reads the election returns November 7, when he learns that Goebelism and this new Democracy have been in one red burial blent, let him say to himself: "Had I served my party with half the zeal I have served myself, Kentucky would not have left me naked to my enemies."—Louisville Evening Post.
