Tobacco Yield.
The United States department of agriculture has issued an estimate on various farm products. The preliminary estimate of the average yield per acre of tobacco is 819 pounds, as compared with the final estimate of 686.3 pounds in 1903, 707.3 pounds in 1902 and a six year average of 730.7. The average as to quality is 89.5 per cent as compared with 85.9 per cent one year ago.

ROCKEFELLER

Now Controls 150,000 Miles of Railroad.
—Illinois Central Latest Acquisition.

Chicago, Nov. 12.—The greatest railroad coup that was ever effected will be carried out within the next few months. It is nothing less than the combination, under one influence of 150,000 miles of railroad, certainly the most gigantic operation of modern times.

The announcement was ready to be made some time ago but it was withheld until after the election, for fear of the result that it would have on the campaign.

The Rockefeller and the Standard Oil company have acquired control of the Illinois Central, the Burlington, the Erie lines, the Pennsylvania, the Santa Fe, Missouri Pacific and St. Paul. These, added to the roads they already control, will make the enormous mileage quoted.

The Standard Oil company has foreseen the development of a situation that would prevent the railroads from giving them advantages in freight rates which at present amount to shutting competing oil companies out of business and it has decided to get the railroads and run them in its own interest, so much having been avowed by one of the Rockefellers in explaining the movement.

THORNE STORY DENIED

BY COL. BENNETT YOUNG

Lieut. Governor Was Right to be There and Respond for State.

WAS NO PUBLIC DISAPPROVAL

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 12.—Col. Bennett H. Young this morning gave out the following statement regard to a publication this morning about Lieut. Gov. Thorne's speech at the Confederate reunion at Pewee Matley:

"The statement in the Courier-Journal this morning in which I am quoted as saying 'that incident was the only draw back to the success of the occasion' I did not make about Mr. Thorne. Mr. Thorne did not force himself forward in speaking. The speaking was from the porch of the Confederate Home, and when it began Mr. Thorne was on the porch. A few people came to me and objected to Gov. Thorne taking part in the exercises. There was no hissing. There was no public disapproval. I was not taken by surprise at all. There was some objection made by a few people to Gov. Thorne speaking, but it was my duty to recognize the office and the officer. After exercises began I expected the Lieutenant Governor to speak, because he was present on the platform. Mr. Thorne had brothers who were Confederate soldiers, and there was no reason why he should not come to the dedication exercises of the home. I am sure he did not know the Governor would not be there when he came. It was a neighborly, friendly, kindly act. There was no arrangements with the Lieutenant Governor to speak, because no arrangements were necessary, as the Governor had promised to come.

"I did not know until twenty minutes after 11 o'clock that the Governor would not come, and no one else knew it. The matter has been exaggerated, and it produced no excitement on the grounds. My personal relations with Gov. Thorne have always been kindly, and there was neither cause or desire to treat him with any rudeness or disrespect. His speech was frequently applauded, and no one made any public remark or did any public act which was discourteous to him."
