PARDONS REFUSED

Gov. Willson Acts Unfavorably on two Applications for Clemency.

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 2.—Gov. Willson today refused to pardon George Davis, of Carlisle county, sentenced to the penitentiary for life on the third conviction. His last offense was malicious cutting. The Governor says the reason for request of the pardon are not sufficient.

He also refused to pardon the jail sentence imposed on Vincent Hamilton, of Bracken county, fined \$25 and sentenced to ten days in jail for carrying concealed a deadly weapon. Hamilton is of a prominent family and has just married. He claimed he was taking the pistol home with him, but the Governor says he should have done it in a lawful manner; that is, openly.

CONTINUES TO IMPROVE WITH HIS NECK BROKEN

Weir's Condition Still Critical Says Dr. Gilbert.

James Weir, the man with the broken neck, who is making such a game fight for his life at Gilbert's sanitarium, is recovering slowly and yesterday showed a slight improvement over the previous day. He is still in a dangerous condition, although his physician stated that there was no immediate danger. Weir's case has attracted considerable attention as it is sometimes seldom heard of. He will undergo an operation as soon as his condition will permit, but this is not expected to take place for several more days.

MINERS TO STRIKE

About 30,000 Men Will Be Affected Independent Collieries Operate.

Kansas, City, Aug. 2.—Negotiations between miners and coal operators of the Southwestern territory, which have dragged along over a period of four months were brought to an end to-day.

A general strike order will be issued immediately, according to George Manual, secretary of the Missouri district, and 30,000 or more miners, who have not worked since the expiration of the old contract, April 1, will be formally on strike.

The conclusion of negotiations came after the miners had been in session the greater part of the day and had waited for the operators to agree to these proposition to hold a joint session, at which a wage scale based upon what is known as the "Cincinnati demand" could be discussed.

Conference committees had been appointed by the miners to meet such committees as to operators held that by agreement neither the operators nor the miners could demand a joint meeting.

Of the number of miners affected by the strike order about 2,500 are in Kansas, about 8,500 in Missouri, 9,000 in Oklahoma, and about 3,000 in Arkansas.

"Independent" mines in this territory that are paying the wage scale asked, will continue at work.

ENGINEERS WILL RECEIVE MORE MONEY.

Wages Will be Increased from 13 to 15 Per Cent.

Louisville, Aug. 3.—It is stated that members of the Louisville and Nashville Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers have been granted an increase in wages from 12 to 15 per cent., varying with the runs of the different engineers affected.

This statement came following a six weeks session of the adjustment committee of a brotherhood headed by Chairman T. J. Bissett, of Memphis. For some time the committee, which is nearing the end of its work, has been in conference with B. M. Starks, general manager of the road.

A conference was being held today and it was impossible to get in touch with General Manager B. W. Starks, of the L. & N., or Chairman Bissett, of the adjustment committee. There seems to be little doubt, though, but that the increase has been made. Several hundred engineers are effected.

The men earn on an average at the present time \$1.05 per day.

GOVERNOR ORDERS TRANSFER

Cannot Understand Why Prisoners Are Held by Militiamen.

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 2.—Although nothing has been heard from Lyon county regarding the trouble of Saturday, in which the soldiers on duty at Milton Oliver's house were involved, in charge of the detail of soldiers, to turn over to the civil authorities the men who have issued a general order that in all cases where an arrest for violation of the civil laws is made by the militia, the prisoner will be turned over to the proper civil authorities.

Gov. Willson and Gen. Johnston both said they could see nothing else to do, and they did not understand, not being informed as to the facts, why the commander of the troops acted otherwise in this case. Nothing has been heard from Maj. Bassett, who probably will make his report in writing.
