JOHN O'BRYANT KILLED

Shot While Resisting Arrest Wednesday Morning, by Deputy Sheriff John Ashby.

CORONER'S JURY EXONERRATES ASHBY.

John O'Bryant, colored of Madisonville, better known as (Shine) was shot and almost instantly killed by deputy Sheriff, Jno. Ashby Wednesday morning about 11 o'clock. O'Bryant was wanted on the charge of robbery, he having snatched the purse of Mrs. Ward, wife of Contractor Ward, while driving to the construction camp near Madisonville some time ago. At the time of his arrest O'Bryant was a waiter in Herrin's Restaurant and when Deputy Proctor Ashby started to arrest him he ran and hid in a vacant house. Deputy Ashby followed him and shot at him four times on the way. On entering the house O'Bryant, who was hid behind the door, struck Ashby several times, took his pistol away from him and ran up the Providence branch towards the canning factory. Deputy Proctor Ashby, who was badly injured, notified Sheriff Stanley of the matter and a posse was hastily summoned, composed of Deputy Sheriffs Claud Ford, John Ashby, Chief Graddy, Policeman Wilson and Ches Bradley, who went on a hunt for the negro. He was found in some high weeds in a garden after considerable search, and on being commanded to hold up his hands, did so with a pistol in them. Deputy Ashby thinking it was loaded and his life was in danger, shot O'Bryant just above the eye, killing him instantly. Coroner Stevens was notified and held an inquest. Following is the verdict of the Coroner's jury:

We, the jury, find the dead body before us to be that of Jno. O. Bryant, colored, who came to his death at the hands of Deputy Sheriff John Ashby while attempting to arrest him on a warrant against him for robbery, said John O'Bryant attempting to shoot said Ashby, said Ashby firing on him and killing him instantly. The jury further finds said Ashby fully justifiable in said act.
