EARLINGTON COAL MINERS ARE GREATLY INTERESTED

Messrs. Williams, Sams and Powell, of Department of Mines Rescue Car No. 3.

Gave Interesting and Valuable Illustrated Lecture and Demonstrations.

BIG ATTENDANCE AT TEMPLE THEATRE ON WEDNESDAY NIGHT.

Thos. O. Long, Assistant Mine Inspector Presided at the Meeting.

The illustrated lecture given Wednesday night at Temple Theatre by Mr. Williams and his associates, from the U. S. Rescue Car No. 3, was one of the most interesting and instructive things that the people of Earlington have experienced. Mr. Williams' lecture was accompanied by a very enlightening series of pictures thrown on the screen, which he explained in detail to the large and very much interested audience. He covered the question of loss of life in the mines and of the methods and machinery for rescue work; the experiments and the practical demonstration of life saving which the Department of Mines is making already in the more favored and important mining sections of the country, of which Earlington is one of the first; dealt with the question of various kinds of powders and other explosives; showed the different methods of testing the explosive force of gas and dust; the use of oxygen helmets, and various other things touching the miner's occupation and the safe operation of a coal mine. One interesting point brought out by Mr. Williams showed the relative safety of coal operations in Hopkins county coal mines. In showing a diagram illustrating the loss of life in coal mines of various counties he called attention to the rate in Belgium as the lowest in any country producing any considerable coal tonnage and said the figures he had been given on the St. Bernard group of mines put this group in the same class with Belgium. This notwithstanding that the loss of life in coal mines in the United States is far and away greater than in any other country.

Mr. Sams displayed the oxygen helmet and went through the form of rescuing Tom Peyton, who played the part of a miner overcome by afterdamp. The pulmotor was used in this illustration and was most interesting in its wonderful process of filling the lungs with oxygen and exhausting them, automatically producing artificial respiration. This machine adjusts itself to the capacity of the lungs and can be used in resuscitating adult or child.

Mr. Powell gave an interesting series of practical illustrations of first aid to the injured. He gave demonstrations in splinting and tying a broken arm, dislocated shoulder and broken leg. In showing the latter an improvised stretcher was made by using two drills and the coats of two of the rescue party which was new to the majority of the audience. Messrs. Sams and Long assisted in these object lessons and the entire audience paid close attention to all that was said and done as the majority were miners and deeply interested in the work. There were some 300 men

present and a number of ladies and children.

The rescue car now in the siding at this place will leave Saturday and every miner who can possibly do so should attend the lectures given each morning, afternoon and night.

The speakers were introduced by Thos. O. Long, assistant mine inspector for Kentucky, who presided at the meeting and took part in the demonstrations.

Mr. Williams expressed appreciation of treatment extended his party by the citizens of Earlington and the local coal company officials, who, he said, had shown them every courtesy.

MADISONVILLE TO INVESTIGATE COST OF CHEMICAL FIRE ENGINE

New City Board of Health—The Chewing Gum Machine Must Go.

Madisonville, Ky., Feb. 8.—The city council last night passed an ordinance prohibiting the operation of chewing gum machines in this city. The chief of police was instructed to have these machines removed by Thursday or the proprietors of the thirty machines would be subject to indictment. Should the machines still remain in operation the council has decided to fix a license of \$1,000 for their operation.

A committee has been appointed by the city council to investigate the cost of a chemical fire engine for Madisonville. Equipment will be purchased for the volunteer department of the city.

The city board of health was reorganized here today. M. K. Gordon, Lee Gibson and Joe E. Hibbs compose the board. The board increased the salary of the city health officer from \$100 to \$175 annually.

NORTONVILLE COAL AND COKE COMPANY

Will Make Extensive Improvements in Various Ways at Nortonville.

The Nortonville Coal & Coke Company are making arrangements for extensive improvements at their mines and in the city of Nortonville. Among other improvements they will build a power house and the city will have electric lights. All the streets are to be macadamized and a large hotel, with all modern improvements, is to be erected. The company is already clearing ground for a large park south of the city and will also erect fifth houses this spring and summer for the use of their men. A fine bank of potters clay has been discovered near Nortonville and there is some talk of a pottery and tiling factory in the near future. Messrs. Mohr and Hoag are superintending the work now going on and are very enthusiastic over the future of Nortonville and the Nortonville Coal & Coke Company.

CONDUCTING A CAMPAIGN FOR NEW ARMORIES IN KENTUCKY

New Building Not Needed Here But Capt. Malone and Col. Henry Stop Here Enroute.

Capt. P. B. Malone of the U. S. Regular Army, and Col. J. J. Henry of the Third Kentucky Infantry, visited Earlington and Madisonville Wednesday looking over the armories and inquiring into conditions of the local companies. There is a campaign on to increase the armory facilities throughout Kentucky and put the State Guard in first class condition as to armories and equipment as well as organization. Additional companies will also be organized. At Hopkinsville several thousand dollars have been raised for the purpose of building a new armory to be rented for use by Hopkinsville company. No definite effort has been made at Madisonville but it is possible that the question of a new building may be taken up there. Earlington is well provided now and there will be no change here. It is understood that a wealthy Kentuckian is ready and willing to take part of stock in any company organized to build an armory in a Kentucky town. It is reported that the efforts of the above named gentlemen and other officers detailed on like service are meeting with great encouragement throughout Kentucky.

MINERS WORK IN SULPHUR FUMES

All Day Practical Tests of Oxygen Helmet at Arnold Mine Yesterday

SIX MEN AT A TIME WORK IN IMPOSSIBLE ATMOSPHERE.

Practical experiments were made in the use of oxygen helmets by the experts with the Department of Mine rescue car and Assistant Mine Inspector Long, in Arnold Mine of the St. Bernard Mining Company. The work lasted all day. A room 50 feet long was curtained off at the end of an entry where there were no breakthroughs and in this room sulphur was burned till a man could not enter without protection. Six helmets were used on mine employes, who entered the room and worked for hours at a time without discomfort from the fumes, sawing wood, putting up props, digging and doing other work. Six other men used the helmets during the afternoon. These experiments will probably be repeated on Saturday for the benefit of yet other foreman and employes who are anxious for the practical experience with these helmets.


