NO TESTIMONY AS TO BUTTON

Calumet Grand Jury Inquiry Into Christmas Tragedy

GOV. FERRIS SAYS: NO FEDERAL INVESTIGATION IS NECESSARY

Calumet, Mich., Dec. 29.—None of the twenty-five witnesses appearing before the coroner's inquest today testified as to having seen a citizens' alliance button on the coat of the man who started the panic in which nearly a hundred people lost their lives while attending a Christmas eve entertainment in this city.

One of the witnesses, however, declared that he saw a button on the supposed instigator of the fire alarm but was not sure whether it was a citizens' alliance button or not.

One hundred witnesses have been supposed to appear in the inquest.

Investigation Unnecessary.

Big Rapids, Mich., Dec. 29.—After a conference today with John B. Bensmore, solicitor of the Department of Labor, Governor Ferris declared there was no necessity for Federal action, relating to Christmas holocaust at Calumet, nor alleged deportation of Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, from the copper strike scene.

Governor Ferris said the grand jury was not to investigate Hamilton and Moyer or any one else, could go before it and get justice without interference of the Federal authorities.

To Governor Ferris, Denmore made it plain that he came from Washington on a conciliatory mission and not to make a federal investigation.

Miss Mary Mothershead has been chosen by incoming Superintendent of County Schools, L. R. Ray, to be a member of the County Board of Examiners under the new administration. The action of the new County Superintendent is being commented upon very favorably on account of Miss Mothershead's exceptional record and standing as one of the foremost and most progressive teachers in Hopkins county, or in Western Kentucky. The appointment is a source of especial gratification to the people of Earlington, where Miss Mothershead has been continually in charge of the primary work in the Earlington Graded School for some years. It is the first time, too, in very many years that any such recognition has come to an Earlington teacher, though Earlington has the enviable record of some thirty years of long-term free public schools during the much larger part of which time no other school in Hopkins county was taught more than the short common school term of from five to six months, a number of the small county schools, indeed, having even up to the present time been taught so short a time as from two to four months annually.
