"GETTING THE HIGHER UPS"

(TRINIDAD COLORADO NEWS)

The light is being turned in Colorado upon the higher ups in the labor circles, particularly upon the self-seeking officials of the United Mine Workers of America.

Months ago the Pueblo grand jury returned indictments against a score of the high up officials including John P. White, Frank J. Hayes, William Green and others of more local note...

Indictments charging first degree murder have been returned by a Boner county grand jury against W. T. Hickey, secretary of the Colorado State Federation of Labor, and strike leaders in the northern Colorado field...

These indictments grow out of the recent outrages committed by strikers, in which men lost their lives and property was destroyed.

The report of the Boulder county grand jury should be gratifying to every law abiding citizen of Colorado. These men, who have been aiding and abetting outlawry and preaching rebellion against the government of the state should not be allowed to pursue their ruffian work unmolested.

The arm of the law should not strike always at the rank and file, the ignorant lopes of the men who plan and scheme and instigate the crimes and out rages that the little fellows commit.

These men from nowhere have come into the state and fomented strife and caused an industrial war. They have sought to ruin established industries, to wage campaigns of death and destruction and they have through it all assumed a demeanor of "Holier than thou."

But these men who lead and educate irresponsible underlings to violence should not escape.

A score of union men are in jail in Walsenburg awaiting trial for murders and other strike outrages. As many more officials and members of the miners' union are in jail in Trinidad awaiting trial for murder and assault and rioting and conspiracy and arson.

One international organizer, charged with instigating the cold blooded murder of a detective in Trinidad, has been a fugitive from justice since last November.

The light is being turned upon the men who in behalf of labor and the United Mine Workers of America have asked the coal operators of Colorado to recognize them.

BACK TO THE PEN

Iron Workers' Must Resume Prison Sentence - U. S. States Circuit Court of Appeals

ISSUES MANDATE TO THAT EFFECT

Chicago, May 16.—Frank M. Ryan, president of the International Association of Bridge & Structural Iron Works, and eighteen members of the organization must report June 6th to resume serving their sentence at the Leavenworth penitentiary for a conspiracy to transport dynamite on passenger trains.

The explosive was used to wreck bridges and buildings erected by non-union labor.

The United States Circuit Court of Appeals issued a mandate today that the serving of sentences must be resumed within three weeks.

Five of the thirty men originally convicted are already at Leavenworth serving their sentences. Three others have been granted new trials, and a decision on the cases of Olaf A. Tveitmo, of San Francisco; Richard H. Mounihan, of Chicago, and Wm. Barnhardt, who applied for new trial, is expected Monday.

EARLINGTON TELEPHONE EXCHANGE REMODELED

For the past two months the devious equipment crew of Louisville, composed of S. G. Givens, C. T. McMurtry and E. B. Russell, under Manager W. S. Caldwell, equipment foreman, have been in Earlington remodeling and installing modern central office equipment in the exchange.

The switchboard now has a line capacity of 600, where as before it only had a capacity for 210 lines.

Two additional operators positions have been installed making it possible for four operators to be on the board at once, thereby giving subscribers better and faster service as every subscriber can be answered by any one operator.

The total cost of the new equipment being \$2,000.

In the near future all of the outside overhead lines will be put into cable at a large cost, thereby reducing a large amount of trouble that is frequent in open wire but does not appear in cable.
