PREPARING FOR WATER FAMINE

L. & N. Begins Hauling Water to Shelbyville

ARRANGEMENTS MADE TO SEND WATER TRAINS ALL ALONG LINE

Today the Louisville & Nashville railroad will haul water from Louisville to Shelbyville, where the supply has been cut on account of the drouth, and unless rain comes within a week water trains will have to be sent to needy points all along the line. The L. & N. trains in Kentucky use about 5,000,000 gallons of water a day. While the railroad officials are hoping for rain they are also preparing against any exigency that may arise. Arrangements are being made to set aside an extra supply of water so the system can stand months of drouth and, if necessary, furnish water to towns where the supply has been depleted. The water will be obtained from the Kentucky and Green rivers and from the Ohio River.

TO CARRY EXTRA TANK
The ordinary freight engine with a 7,000-gallon tank can go but about twenty miles without replenishing its supply. Many places they depend upon a municipal water plant and in cases of drouth these supplies are cut off by the city or town in order that the people may not be endangered. The trains, therefore, will carry an extra tank so they can go forty miles and water from the rivers will be taken to the replenishing stations.

The report of one railroad official, who has just returned from a trip of inspection through the State, is that the wheat crop is the best in several years; that corn has not been perceptibly damaged, and that the oats crop looks promising.

Kentucky is now 8.31 inches behind normal on the rainfall for the year and the farmers are hoping that this deficit will not grow. The rainfall since January 1st has been but 15.6 inches and the United States Government records show that it should reach 44.33 inches before December 31.

JERRY McNARY DEAD AT AGE OF SEVENTY-FIVE

Respected Colored Citizen Who Had Worked 38-Years For Coal Company

Jerry McNary died at St. Bernard Hospital Tuesday evening at 5:45 o'clock after an illness of about three weeks from the time he came home from his work ill and took his bed in a critical condition. His remains were buried at Earlinton Cemetery Wednesday afternoon, accompanied by kindred and friends, the company including white friends of the deceased who had known and trusted him for many years. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Thos. Merriweather at the little home on Main street, where Jerry and Eliza have lived for many years and where Eliza will continue to make her home. There is perhaps nowhere a colored couple more respected and esteemed by their white friends and neighbors than have been Jerry and Eliza McNary, who have lived usefully and well, holding undisturbed confidence and friendship of the good neighborhood in which they have lived for so long. Jerry was about seventy-five years old at his death. He belonged, before the war, to Col. William C. McNary, of Muhlenberg county. Eliza, his wife who survives, was raised in the family of Dr. Thomas McNary, at Princeton, a brother of Col. McNary. Jerry went to war for a time, before he was freed, but after a time came back to the farm. Jerry and Eliza were married in 1877, one year after he began work for the St. Bernard Coal Co. His service with the St. Bernard people began in 1876 and his work for that concern was faithful and practically unbroken for the entire thirty-eight years to the day of his last illness.
