MEXICO CITY EVACUATED

Federal Army Withdrawing, But Will be Ready to Act

Mexico City—The Federal army is withdrawing to Puebla, where it will be held ready for action by War Minister Velasco, if the Constitutionalists forces commit excesses in the Capital. The evacuation of the Capital was decided upon Monday night when Provisional President Carbajal announced that he would leave for Vera Cruz immediately.

The Chamber of Deputies will dissolve and the Supreme Court will take similar action as soon as the resignation of Carbajal has been received officially.

The Constitutionalists troops are expected to arrive here on Thursday or Friday. In the meantime scores of legislators and officials who supported General Huerta will flee to the coast. Seven special trains have been arranged for and the first left early today.

meat and oil surpass last year's record by nearly \$40,000,000, according to figures of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce.

The Prevention of Hydrophobia.

To the peace officer, health officers' and the people of Kentucky: A recent examination of dogs heads from widely separated sections of the state shows an alarming prevalence of Hydrophobia. Under the authority conferred upon it by law, the State Board of Health hereby requests and directs all persons owning valuable dogs to keep them on their premises or to have them carefully muzzled, and sheriffs, chief of police, constables and people generally are hereby requested and directed to destroy, as painlessly as possible, all unmuzzled dogs running at large with a view to the prevention of Hydrophobia. Failure to observe this request is punishable by fine before any magistrate.

Through arrangements with the United States Public Health Service, the Board of Health is enabled to give the Pasteur treatment to the Bacteriological Laboratory, Bowling Green, Kentucky, without expense, to individuals who have been bitten by rabid dogs or other animals. Dog's heads, suspected of being mad, should be sent to the Laboratory, by express prepaid, and the result of the examination will be telephoned or telegraphed.

This Board takes this occasion to inform the people of Kentucky that mad stones are useless if one is really bitten by an infected animal, use gives a false sense of security and their use is forbidden by law.

A Two-Story Lake

One of the wonders of Mexico is the self-producing lake near Salinas Station, on the Tampico division of the Mexican Central Railway, seventy-two miles west of San Luis Potosi. It may well be termed a two-story lake, for at times there is a lake of fresh water overlying the salt lake. A water-tight roof of green mud separates the fresh from the salt water.

For a large part of the year there is no fresh-water lake there. The sun licks it up soon after the rainy season is over.

The salt secured from the lake goes all over Mexico. The lake

has been worked about sixty-five years. The whole town of 5,000 people makes its living from the salt.

The property is owned by a family or estate, but it is said that not one of the owners has lived there for years. The old residence of the owners is still standing at Salinas. Its massive walls and towers and turrets give the place a resemblance to a fort or feudal castle.

McCreary County to
Record no Illiteracy

McCreary County, the infant county of Kentucky, created by the General Assembly of 1912, and named in honor of Governor James B. McCreary, has a high ambition for itself in its educational ranking. The county officials, teachers and citizens of the county have banded themselves together to have its first census, when taken in 1920, record, "no illiterates." Their plan is to obliterate illiteracy during the next three years, and to watch the field during the remaining three, seeking out and teaching all who come in. Superintendent Nora E. Alcorn is leading the campaign, and 51 moonlight schools will start on Sept. 7th.

BEEF IS BOUGHT ARMIES OF FRANCE

Initial Purchase of Two Million Pounds Shows High Demand

Chicago—The first large sale of American meats to the belligerent nations of Europe for army rations was recorded in Chicago today. Armour & Co. announced that the French government had completed a deal for 2,000,000 pounds of canned beef.

According to information supplied to the Chicago Packing Co. the beef will be distributed among the army corps already mobilized for battle.

FIGHT AGAINST CHILD LABOR

BRINGS RESULTS

Decrease in Number of Child Workers in The United States

The child labor is decreasing in the United States is proved by the Report on Occupations recently published by the Bureau of the Census. This report shows that between 1900 and 1910 there was a decrease of 129, 236 in the number of children 10 to 15 years of age engaged in non-agricultural pursuits. Of this number 77, 686 were boys and 51, 570 girls. The National Child Labor Committee consider the Census figures very gratifying as showing the results of their work.

"We have been sure for some time," says Owen R. Lovejoy, General Secretary of the National Child Labor Committee, in commenting on the Census report, "that there must have been a decrease in the number of children at work, but until now we have never had official figures to prove such a decrease. Since our organization in 1904 we have secured improved child labor or compulsory education laws in every state of the Union. There are still 8 states, however, in which the generally accepted 14-year of age limit for work in manufacturing establishments is not recognized, 14 states that allow children under 16 to work at night, and a great number of states that do not properly regulate the employment of children in dangerous trades, street trades and various occupations outside of factories and stores. So we still have plenty of work to do. We regard the census figures as important not only because they show the results of our work but because they suggest what can be done if the American people once set their minds to keeping their children out of industry and giving them education and health."

The Clay County Illiteracy Commission

Clay County has gone on record as being the first county to organize a County Illiteracy Commission to stamp out illiteracy. At the recent session of the Clay County Institute, addresses were made on the subject by Dr. J. T. O. Noe, Dean of Normal Department of State University, and by Mrs. Cora Wilson Stewart, President Kentucky Illiteracy Commission, and there was a hearty response—ninety-three teachers volunteered for service, \$50.75 was contributed on the spot for expenses of postage, etc., although no contributions had been requested. A commission was formed to co-operate with Superintendent Luther Hatton in the campaign.

The officers of the Commission elected by the Institute were: Dr. J. S. Manning, President; T. L. Britton, Vice-Pres.; Charles Goins, Recording Sec'y; Mrs. Luther Hatton, Corresponding Sec'y; J. W. Newell, Treasurer. There are 2,860 illiterate in Clay County, and men, women and children are enlisted to rid the county of illiteracy.
