Corn canning is, so to speak, a by-product of a rural situation which was driving the girls to town to clerk and do stenography as a means of earning some ready money. Then the canning demonstrator arrived and taught the girls at the school-houses to do the trick. The result is 5,000,000 cases of canned corn, or 60,000,000 cans at a dozen in the case. Of course, the girls didn't do it all! But they are a bigger part of this wonderful revival of one of the most revolutionary of household industries, and which has possibly done more than any single influence to restore the economic attractiveness of the American farmstead to its present state of prosperity.
