THE CITY COUNCIL OF EARLINGTON

At a Meeting Held Wednesday Night, August 2nd 1916

PASSED THE FOLLOWING ORDINANCE

The City Council of the City of Earlinton do ordain as follows:

That Section 1 of Article 15 of the ordinance and bylaws of the City of Earlinton, Kentucky, in effect January 2, 1914, as amended by ordinance of April 1, 1912, be and the same is hereby further amended as follows:

That there shall be added thereto the following:

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, barter or loan, directly or indirectly, any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol, within the corporate limits of the City of Earlinton, Kentucky, and any person who shall sell, barter or loan, directly or indirectly, any such beverage within said corporate limits, shall, upon conviction, be fined the sum of not less than (\$20.00) Twenty Dollars, nor more than (\$100.00) One Hundred Dollars, for each offense, so that Section 1 of Article 15 of the ordinance and by laws of the City of Earlinton, as now amended, shall read as follows:

Section 1. Any person who shall, without license so to do, sell or otherwise dispose of any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, within the corporate limits of the City of Earlinton, Ky, shall for each offense be fined not less than (\$50.00) Fifty Dollars, nor more than (\$100.00) One Hundred Dollars.

Section 2.—It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, barter or loan, directly or indirectly, any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol, within the corporate limits of the City of Earlinton, Kentucky, and any person who shall sell, barter or loan, directly or indirectly, any such beverage within said corporate limits, shall, upon conviction, be fined the sum of not less than (\$20.00) Twenty Dollars, nor more than (\$100.00) One Hundred Dollars, for each offense.

The City Council of the City of Earlinton do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That before engaging in the occupation of selling by retail what is called soft drinks, and before engaging in the occupation of selling cider the person partnership or corporation desiring to do so shall procure a license and pay an annual tax thereon of \$1.00. Provided, however, that no license shall be required to sell cider by the maker thereof in quantities not to be drunk at the time and not to be drunk on the premises of the person so selling.

Section 2. A soft drink within the meaning of this ordinance is a beverage containing no percentage whatever of alcohol and any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol shall not be considered a soft drink within the meaning of this ordinance.

Section 3. Any person found guilty of violating this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$10.00 or more than \$100.00 for each offense and each sale shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4. No such license shall be granted except upon a written application, to the City Council, specifying the name of the applicant, and if a partnership, the name of each

partner in the firm, and the particular house wherein such business shall be conducted, and the room or rooms of the houses in which said business is proposed to be conducted. The applicant shall satisfy the City Council that he is a good moral character, and will keep an orderly, law-abiding house. No person who has at any time been found guilty of a violation of any local option law or of any law against gaming shall be granted such license.

Section 5. Said license shall be granted for the period of one year, and shall at all times be subject to revocation or cancellation for cause by the City Council, upon reasonable notice, without refunding any part of the license tax or fees.

Section 6. Every person who shall obtain a license to retail such soft drinks or cider within the City shall at the time same is granted enter into a bond with good surety, payable to the City, in the sum of (\$500.00) Five Hundred Dollars, to be approved by the City Council, in substance as follows:

"BOND"

Whereas has been granted license to retail soft drinks and cider in the City of Earlinton, Kentucky, for the period of one year from this date, now we and his sureties, do hereby covenant and with the City of Earlinton that the said license remains in force, will keep an orderly law abiding house and that he will not suffer or permit any gaming or any scandalous or disorderly conduct or behavior in his house, and that he will not sell, give, furnish or otherwise dispose of any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or permit any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors to be drunk in his place of business; and we further especially covenant to and with said City that he will not sell, give, furnish or otherwise dispose of any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol or permit any beverage containing any percentage of alcohol to be drunk in his place of business; and upon the breach of this bond we will pay to the said City the penal sum of \$500.00

Witness our hands this the day of August, 1916.

Section 7. If any person to whom such license has been granted shall be convicted in any court, upon a charge of any violation of any local option law or of any law against gaming or of conducting a disorderly house, such conviction shall be conclusive evidence of a breach of said bond and it shall be forthwith proceeded upon by a suit in any court having jurisdiction, and further, upon such conviction the City Council shall cancel such license, and there after said license shall be void and of no effect, and upon proof being made to the City Council upon reasonable notice to the holder of such license that he has been guilty of a breach of said bond by selling, giving, furnishing or otherwise disposing of any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol or of permitting any beverage containing any percentage whatever of alcohol to be drunk in his place of business, the said bond shall be forthwith proceeded upon by suit in any court having jurisdiction, and the City Council shall cancel said license and thereafter same shall be void and of no effect.

Section 8. All laws or ordinances or parts of laws or ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 9. The foregoing ordinances shall be and become in full force and effect on and after its adoption, approval and publication.

KY. TROOPS WILL GO TO EL PASO

War Department Tells Officers at Ft. Thomas of Brigade's Destination on Border

Ft. Thomas, Ky., Aug. 2.—El Paso will be the destination of the Kentucky brigade when it moves to the border. This information was received by brigade officers today from the war department at Washington, D.C., which has formerly been selected as the Maryland brigade which succeeded in getting ready earlier than the troops at Fort Thomas.

Brigadier General Williams explained tonight that the earlier the regiments here recruited the better chance they stood to secure a favorable location on the border. He intimated that the El Paso site might slip from the Kentucky troops unless recruiting goes forward with prompt results.

Of the eleven new recruits arriving at camp today from Covington where the first regiment has been concentrating its energy nine men were rejected upon physical examination. Reports from other sections of the state have not been received here.

The dental corps, which has been recommended by Maj. Charles W. Hobbs of Louisville received its official sanction today when authorization for the creation of such a corps was received from the department of the east. Capt. Marion Bryant and Omar Stanton Meredith were designated dental surgeons, with the rank of first lieutenant.

VARIETY OF FOOD FOR THE SOLDIERS

Beef and Potatoes Diet Varied to Suit The Taste

Fort Thomas, Ky., Aug. 3.—Capt. Armstrong, United States Army, has taken complete charge of the Quartermasters and Commissary arrangements for the troops and his administration was ushered in by a complete change and rejuvenating of the system of issuing commissary supplies.

Instead of the conventional beef, potatoes, bacon, bread, prunes and coffee, it will now be possible to draw a part of the ration in beef and the balance in some other kind of meat, such as sausage, liver, mutton, etc., while flour may be substituted for bread and supplies not drawn or required are credited against other articles purchased from the commissary. It is anticipated that the new system will result in a more evenly balanced ration, and that there will be much satisfaction among the men when the ration can be varied from day to day. The qualities of the supplies is excellent and the quantity abundant, and the company cooks of most of the organizations are competent, but the sameness of the meals has been the only cause for complaint.

PROMOTIONS IN COMPANY G

John A. Moore Promoted to Second Lieutenant

Ft. Thomas, Ky., August 3.—Announcement has been made by Adj. Gen. J. Tandy Ellis of the promotion of Second Lieut. J. L. Miles to first lieutenant of Company G, Vice Thor. Payton, who failed to pass the federal examination. J. A. Moore, first class sergeant of the sanitary detachment, has been promoted to second lieutenant of Co. G. Rev. John S. Hawkins, pastor of the Christian Church here, is regimental chaplain with the rank of lieutenant. It is stated in the announcement that Dr. W. K. Nisbet of this city is made captain in the medical corps, but as he already had the rank of captain it is an error and evidently should be major unless the rank of major for the medical corps has been abolished.

SEVEN CHILDREN SAVED BLINDNESS

School Inspections Resumed by Visiting Nurse of County Health League

TWELVE COUNTRY SCHOOLS ARE INSPECTED THIS WEEK

The Hopkins County Public Health League Work is being pushed again in school inspections. Miss Frederick, visiting nurse of the League, has, with the assistance of several physicians, inspected eleven schools since Monday morning and is today inspecting Suthard's school with the assistance of Dr. W. P. Ross of this place. The other doctors who have assisted Miss Frederick this week in the South end of the County are: T. R. Finley, W. L. Morse, of St. Charles; M. S. Veal, Daniel Boone; and L. E. Nichols, Dawson Springs. Up to and including yesterday 239 children has been examined in these inspections. There were 44 cases of trachoma found and 22 children with adenoids and enlarged tonsils needing surgical treatment. The eleven schools inspected are Gilliland, Miss Ruth Ashmore, teacher; Cranor, Miss Maud Blane, teacher; Hamby, Miss Elsie Terry, teacher; Norton, Sam Franklin, teacher; Goodhope, Porter Hudson, teacher; Cross Roads, Miss Aattie Gamblin, teacher; Ferguson, Miss Charlie Sisk, teacher; Walnut Grove, F. K. Beshear, teacher; Union Grove, Miss Bonnie Beshear, teacher; Menser, Frank Dunn, teacher.

Two of the schools mentioned above, namely, Cranor's and Ferguson have no trachoma at all among the pupils. The largest number of cases found in any one school were nine cases at Walnut Grove.

The Health League work was presented before the teachers institute at Dawson Springs last Thursday afternoon by Miss Frederick and Paul M. Moore, president of the Hopkins County Public Health League, at which time nearly all of the County teachers were present and showed a lively interest in the subject. Miss Frederick was given personal assurance by many of the teachers of their cooperation when she could arrange to visit and inspect their schools. Miss Frederick was in Earlinton yesterday and said she expected to continue the campaign actively until every school in the County had been inspected. She said that the approval of the teachers and patrons of the schools and the professional services freely given by the doctors of the county were a most encouraging for the future continuance of the big work of health improvement that has been undertaken by the League organized for the benefit of Hopkins County. A general membership campaign will soon be inaugurated, before the beginning of the League's fiscal year, in an effort to give everybody an opportunity to join the League and assist in the good work. One very powerful argument in favor of the continuance and broadening of this work came out in a statement made at Dawson by Miss Frederick that through the inspection and clinics held in the County since last October at least seven children have been saved from total blindness.
