This we can do whoever the people may say shall be the nominee, but when the editor consults his own personal feelings in the matter we feel that the people of Kentucky owes a debt of gratitude to Dr. Hunter for valiant services in the party that has never yet been paid, and now the voters of this grand old Eleventh, the banner district of the United States, have the opportunity to show to the world that they do appreciate his services in the party by honoring him with the nomination to Congress.

Dr. Hunter has the distinguished honor of being the first Republican to carry his Legislative district for the Republican ticket; the first to carry the Third Congressional district for Congress on the Republican ticket, and under his able and efficient management as Chairman of the State campaign, carried the State the first time in its history and elected the entire State ticket for the Republican party.
