A HUNT FOR OFFICE.

With the notification of Henry G. Davis, the Democratic nominee for the Vice Presidency, the great mass of the American people believed that the last preliminary formalities of the campaign were out of the way.

They forgot the Peoples party, which held its "surprise" exercises in New York Thursday night, and while their oversight may be easily explained they will do well to pay attention to the really remarkable speech delivered by Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, the candidate for President on the Populist ticket.

Mr. Watson does not believe that either Mr. Roosevelt or Mr. Parker should be elected to the chief magistracy of the Nation. He is honest in asserting that he stands for principles of greater virtue and promise than either of them can offer, but at the same time he is not blind to the

comparative merits of the principles they do offer. In his speech of acceptance he analyzed their principles, and he did it with convincing skill. He was measuring the strength of his enemies in the analysis, and he may reasonably claim, therefore, an absence of bias in favor of either.

The campaign has so far seen no completer exposition of Democratic sham than he gave. His words need no comment. Here they are:

"Our political history has never seen a situation so ludicrous as that which the National Democracy now holds. I can understand how the citizens can work for the Republican party and vote its ticket with enthusiastic zeal but why any human being should, in 1904, vote the National Democratic ticket is something that passes my comprehension. By what right do the Democratic leaders undertake to preach and expound to the American people any economic question? Never in the world could it emphasize itself on any issue as it did on the money question from 1896 to 1904. It seems to me to be the most amazing piece of effrontery for the Democratic party to go before the American people and proclaim that for eight years it has been wrong and the Republicans have been right, and, at the same time, demand that the crowd which has been wrong shall be put in the places of those who have been right. I believe that, if the gold standard be right, as both of the old parties now say it is, the people will give the credit and the support to the men who were brave enough to pioneer its way, fight its battles and win its triumph. Boiled down to the real essence, sifted to its real meaning, the Democratic campaign of 1904 is a mere unscrupulous hunt for office. Stealing the platform of the Peoples party in 1896, stealing that of the Republicans in 1904—how can the Democracy now pretend to be a party based upon conviction?"—Pittsburg Times.
