CANDIDATES IN TOWN

Tuesday Largest Crowd For Many Days Present For Drawing Positions on Ballot.

Republican Candidates Pledge Support of Nominces and Adopt Resolutions of Harmony.

Tuesday the largest crowd of candidates was in town that has assembled here for years, due to the fact that this was the date set for the official drawing for position on the ballot in the coming August primary election.

The drawing took place in the afternoon and at the conclusion the Republican candidates met in the court room and adopted resolutions inviting all those who voted against the straight ticket last fall to return to their party and vote for their choice regardless of their affiliations last year.

There have been reports circulated over the county to the effect that the Republicans did not want those who voted for Roosevelt last fall to vote the Republican ticket in the coming primary, but this report was repudiated by the resolutions adopted at this meeting and they extended an invitation for all who so desired to vote in any manner in which they wished, and as a proof of their sincerity, adopted resolutions asking the County Clerk to supply ballots at all precincts to all parties in sufficient number that every citizen might vote for the man of his choice.

The following are the resolutions adopted:

WHEREAS, At places where voters were required to register for the Presidential election in November, 1912, the registration showed that but few voters had any intention of leaving the old parties and affiliating with the new, or Progressive Party; and whereas, most of those who voted for Col. Roosevelt for President, did it because of his personal popularity, or to rebuke a wrong which they considered President Taft and some of his followers had committed, and had no intention of severing their connection with the Republican party and affiliating with the Progressive party; and whereas, most of them are now expressing themselves as desiring to continue their affiliation with the Republican Party, and to participate in its affairs, such as selecting its candidates in the Primary, and supporting them in the final election, and in its other official acts:

Therefore, we the Republican Committee of Knox County, constituting the governing authority of said party in Knox county,

Resolved 1—That we invite all who so registered and so voted in Knox county, to continue their affiliation with the Republican Party and to participate in all its affairs, elections, primaries, etc., and thus aid in redeeming American Industry and Labor from the disasters of the free trade bill, now being enacted by the present Democratic Congress, a bill carrying with it a greater degree of free trade than the Wilson-Gorman bill, of Cleveland's second administration, which so pauperized the country.

Resolved 2—That we respectfully petition the County Court Clerk, of Knox county, that he cause to be printed and sent to every voting precinct in the county a sufficient number of Republican ballots for every one who desires to vote the Republican ticket in the August Primary, that he may thus aid and have a voice in the selection of the officials for his county.

Resolved 3—That while we ask this for our own party, because we believe the number desiring to vote, said Republican Party will be as large as heretofore. We have no objections to any other parties, or the candidates of any other parties having as many ballots printed and sent to every precinct in the county as they desire, so that every voter in county may have the privilege of

voting for whatever party, ticket or candidates he chooses.

Resolved 4—That we believe and desire that every voter in the county should have a right to vote for whatever party or candidates he chooses, and should have a ballot furnished him by the election officers for that purpose. We believe that under a free and Republican Government, and in order to maintain the same every voter should have the right to cast his vote as he chooses and should have that vote counted as cast.

KENTUCKY STATE GUARD

Encampment at Middlesboro, July 16th to 23rd 2000 Officers and Enlisted Men; Interesting Program Planned for Each Day.

Special Train Service To Accommodate the Crowds.

Middlesboro, Ky, July 8, 1913.—All details preparatory to the coming of the Kentucky State Guard, which will go into encampment here July 16th to 23rd, are being rapidly completed. Major Thomas W. Woodward and Lieut. Frank Lusse, of Frankfort, accompanied by Major Jackson Morris, of Pineville, were recently here to perfect details of the preliminary arrangements, such as surveying the camp site, awarding contracts for grading, etc., and expressed themselves as highly pleased with the camp site, which is on Exeter Avenue, just at the west side of the city, and said that they were looking forward to their coming to the mountains with a great deal of pleasure.

The Encampment promises to be the largest ever held in the history of the State Militia, several new companies having recently been organized and will bring together the thirty-five companies at present distributed over the entire State and composed of 128 commissioned officers in addition to more than 2,000 regular enlisted men.

An interesting program has been prepared for each day, with special attractions Saturday, July 19th, on which day the entire Brigade of three Regiments will hold a Review and Parade with the three large Military bands in the line of march. Governor McCreary has signified his intention of being present on that day.

The train service on all lines running into Middlesboro will be operated with a view to the convenience of those desiring to attend the various maneuvers and arrangements are being made for special trains from weham, Harlan and other points.

Among the special attractions for the other days will be a sham battle, field athletics, a hike across Cumberland Gap and some six or eight miles into the country, with encampment for the night and various competitive drills by crack companies. There will be Appalachian League base ball games each day of the Encampment.

This will afford to the citizens of Eastern Kentucky and Tennessee and Southwestern Virginia, an opportunity of witnessing an event unequalled in this section for many years and many merchants and shoppers are expected to combine bine pleasure with business and avail themselves of the special inducements being offered both by the wholesale and retail trade of the city.

No pains have been spared by those having this work in charge to make it a great success and to prepare for the coming of the great number of visitors from surrounding towns who will come to Middlesboro during this special occasion.
