## Matinal Divertisement at Union College

After the regular chapel exercises at Union College last Wednesday morning an enjoyable half hour was spent in an impromptu entertainment of a literary and musical character, in which President Ports and a number of the pupils played leading parts, by way of inaugurating the year's College work, which as President Ports aptly said in introducing the exercises, is usually gladly begun and after nine months of it, as gladly suspended for a season. After prayer by Chaplain E. R. Overly who is also one of the college faculty, having charge of the Bible studies, the President in a few prefatory remarks, in which he expressed regret at the inability of any of the Board of Trustees to be present who he had hoped might have addressed the audience, introduced the first feature of the entertainment, which was one of instrumental music by various skilled performers from among the pupils whose names your reporter did not learn. This was followed by a vocal solo "Old Kentucky," by Miss Davis which was splendidly rendered to an accompaniment on the piano by Miss Ida Cole, the words of the song being by the poet Thomas Argold. Then came a violin solo by Charles Owens, a lad of probably a dozen years or less, to piano accompaniment by his sister, Miss Ethal Owens, which was artistically rendered to the delight of the appreciative and laudatory audience. Afterward other vocal solos were rendered to piano accompaniment by Miss Lovelace, to which little could have been added to have made them more delightfully acceptable. And thus the half hour passed auspiciously only appearing all too short to the audience comprised in large proportion of pupils and their interested relatives and friends. I should perhaps have said at the outset that the Scripture lesson of the morning read by Chaplain Overly is found in Second Timothy, ch. Second, from the first to the fifteenth verse, inclusive, embracing a peculiarly appropriate and instructive lesson. Among other notable educators prominent in religious and educational affairs present was noticed Rev. T. B. Stratton, retiring District Supt., Lexington District of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Altogether the entertainment was a delightful and encouraging one, and in dismissing the large audience President Ports expressed the anticipation of having others in the future.

He is the Republican nominee for Justice of the Peace, in District No. 5, in Whitley county. If the people of his district know him as well as we know him, they will elect him as their guardian of the peace without a dissenting vote. He will make Whitley an officer that they may well feel proud of.

Shelby Gibson and Pryor Carr fined Monday for confederating and handing together to hang a young man, who they claimed, was selling liquor in their railroad construction camp, and after the jury had heard the evidence and instructions of the court, returned a verdict of not guilty, after being out 11 minutes. Mr. Gibson is a citizen of Virginia, and is of a prominent family, and an extensive railroad contractor.

On Tuesday the case of the Commonwealth of Kentucky against Arthur Fore, charged with murder, came to a close, and the jury returned a verdict of guilty of voluntary manslaughter, which carries with it an indeterminate period of from two to twelve years in the State penitentiary. The case was hard fought on both sides, the Commonwealth being represented by Hon. J. B. Snyder, Commonwealth's Attorney, W. R. Lay, County Attorney, and Capt. R. B. Golden, and the defendant by Hon. J. M. Robison and J. D. Tuggle. The case will be appealed; Mr. Fore is a young man, son of C. C. Fore, of near Wilton, who is a prominent citizen and a well-to-do farmer. Mr. Tillery, whom Mr. Fore is charged of killing, came to this county from the county of Clay.
