It is to be hoped that they will desist from the practice, which is exceedingly dangerous to say the least. The sudden death of the negro boy a few Sundays back while trying to "hop" a train, in which accident his head was completely severed from his body, should be a sufficient example to discourage the continuance of such a dangerous practice.

In behalf of the Advocate, we desire to say that the correspondent of the paper from time to time present such facts in the road controversy as we see it from the Artemus side of the question. These articles will be written from time to time by the Artemus correspondent, without the knowledge or approval of the Advocate's Editor and we take it that Mr. McDonald, having the best interest of the entire county as a whole, will be glad to submit to the taxpayers of the county through the columns of his paper the arguments of those who wish the road built via the Fighting Creek route. It is our belief that the route via Artemus is the cheapest and best route, will better serve the county than any other route and if we can be cited otherwise we will as gladly support that view as we do our present views. It is the best interests of the county that we desire to see advanced and it is our belief that they can best be served by building via Artemus.

Several of our citizens attended the Good Roads meeting at Corbin last Saturday. It was agreed at the meeting there to begin building roads from the Bell County line to the junction of the two routes in dispute and later settle this question. At this is a matter of vital interest to taxpayers and more especially to the tax payers in and adjacent to the routes to be served by the different roads, it is the belief

of the supporters of the route that passes through Artemus that the amount of taxes paid on the respective routes or the territories adjacent thereto should at least receive some consideration in the approval of the route. The supporters of the route passing through our village would respectfully show two tax payers who alone pay taxes on an assessed valuation of over four hundred thousand dollars that is in territory adjacent to tributary to the Artemus route, to say nothing of other tax payers who live on the route or of farmers in territory adjacent or tributary to it. In advancing this argument, the supporters of the Artemus route, question very seriously if the entire assessment in the competitive route will reach the assessment placed on these two taxpayers. They can further show that these two taxpayers have no interest in either of the two routes that the building of the road via Artemus would not enhance the sale value of their properties, as they are not for sale, but are devoted to the business conducted by these two taxpayers. At the same time, it is the belief of the Artemus supporters that these taxes paid to the county should have some consideration in the determination of the route to be built.


