WILL A REPUBLICAN VOTE FOR A DEMOCRAT? WE SAY NO.

It is just as bad for any republican to undertake to vote for a democrat. We would call each and all voters of all political parties to Section 1550, Sub. Sec. 19, of Cartolls Kentucky Statute for 1915. And after you have read this we are sure that you will not attempt to vote for any other than your own party

The section of the Statute referred to reads in part as follows:

"That if any judge of the election shall permit any person to vote in the primary other than those who are known to be members of the party which they desire to vote in, shall be fined \$100.00, and if any person shall attempt to vote in any primary any other ballot than the ballot of his party shall be fined \$100.00." The makers and framers of this law intended that the voters of any political party must cast the ballot of his party in the primaries. It is plain that you cannot vote in the republican primary unless you are a republican and supported its NOMINEES, at the last general election. Did you do this at the last general election, Mr. Republican? Did you do it Mr. Democrat? Ask yourselves this question before you attempt to vote in the coming primary.

The law is plain, and we have a judge of the Circuit Court that will hand the law out to the next grand jury without sidestepping in the least. We wrote the Judge a letter the other day asking if he intended to instruct the grand jury to indict the fellows who used Money or liquor in elections and we received the following reply:—

Williamsburg, Ky., July 20, 1917.

Mr. W. H. McDonald,

Barbourville, Ky.

Dear Sir:—

Every man is presumed to know the law concerning the use of money and whiskey in elections, and every citizen has the right to presume that as Judge of this district I shall do my level best to enforce the law in this regard. I do not see how I could say more at this time, and I should not be content with saying less.

This certainly does sound good to the citizens who believe in law and order. There are evidences now that there are some who have already started the "Money Game," they should be met on the half way ground with a warrant right now. The lawmakers of the State have put a limit to the amount that can be lawfully spent, and they have said to whom and for that purpose it shall be paid. The officers of the Courts cannot do anything without the support and co-operation of the CITIZENS. What part

Jarvis Wins Law Suit.

Yesterday morning Chief Justice Warner E. Settle of the Court of Appeals handed down a decision sustaining the Franklin Circuit Court in the mandamus proceedings wherein R. N. Jarvis, was recently elected Judge of the Barbourville Police Court by the members of the board of councilmen. Just after the action of the board of councilmen the same was certified to the Governor of Kentucky in order that he might commission R. N. Jarvis to fill out the unexpired term of Judge J. H. Jarvis, who resigned and went to Colorado. Mr. Jarvis the newly elected Judge being a Republican and one of the fighting kind, Governor Stanley sought to find a Democrat, and appointed and commissioned A. D. Smith. R. N. Jarvis at once filed a suit in the Franklin Circuit Court asking that the Governor be compelled to issue a commission to him as said Judge. Judge Stout, of the Franklin Circuit Court sustained Jarvis in this action and Governor Stanley appealed to the Court of Appeals, with the result as above stated. The commission has not yet reached Judge Jarvis, but it is expected that the same will reach him within the next day or so.

The citizens of Barbourville are represented by the board of councilmen who usually are right in saying what the citizens of the city most desire. This is a signal victory for Judge Jarvis as well as the city, because Jarvis is well qualified to fill the position, being an attorney and having had quite an experience in tutorship under one of the best lawyers in eastern Kentucky. The Advocate, together with its many friends now give three cheers for R. N. Jarvis.

The Republicans of the County as well as the city should feel proud of Judge Jarvis in the fact that he compelled the Governor Kentucky to submit to the will of the people.


