All women wear tightly clinging gowns and bodices that mould the figure. Few women look well in them.

Cotton and muslin balayouses are to be replaced by silk or a thick colored zephyr embroidered in white.

Turquoise and jet is the latest fashionable combination. Bodices and the fronts of skirts are frequently embroidered with them.

Among the most popular wedding presents are trinegrettes, with large dull gold tops, bearing the bride's monogram set in diamonds and rubies.

Woolen muslins are taking the place of the organzies. Some resemble Nottingham lace; others are striped or plaided. All are stylish and durable.

The new make of shirt is more lady-like than the stiff manish front, and is arranged all over with small inch-wide blue pleats drawn in at the waist beneath a belt.

Corsets are made in Swiss belt fashion, with slight points below the waist, and much longer points rising on the chest in front and between the shoulders in the back.

Cairo embroideries are novel and beautiful, and promise to be largely used on Winter dresses, on vests, cuffs, pockets and boleros already in use are most effective. The workers as well as the wares are to be imported to England.

Soft twill petticoats, in deep red, scarlet, old pink, or any preferred color, are made with five bias ruffles pinked out on each edge and gathered full. These petticoats are very light in weight, and have superseded lace-trimmed China silk skirts for both house and street wear.

It is prophesied by the seers that long gold chains are coming in again. The new ones are set with pearls by way of variety, and a certain great duchess has set the seal of popularity upon them by appearing in one which many of the fashionable women in London are hurriedly copying.

New pocket handkerchiefs are embroidered in flowers in their natural colors, and each one is stamped with initials in a different color. Very French indeed are those of sheer white linen, edged with deep red lace in black and with black lace butterflies or bees applied on the lines.

The odor of white flowers is for some unknown reason supposed to be more delicate than that of colored flowers. Toilette tables, therefore, are crowded with white violet, white lilac, white heliotrope, white laburnum and other "parfums blancs."

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., October 2.—The political outlook for the Democrats in this district grows brighter every day, and from all reports received Mr. William A. Jones, our standard-bearer for Congress, will down Mr. Bayley Browne and retire him to private life. His action on the Force Bill and in the Langston-Venable case has greatly injured him and a number of his former followers are outspoken for Jones; and while the seating of Langston may gain him some negro votes the white votes he will lose by it will be great in excess. Both parties, however, are making a strong fight, and Mr. Jones is making one of the most thorough canvasses ever made in this district.

THE EIGHTH DISTRICT. The fight in the Eighth district waxes warm every day, and while Hume has some following in Stafford and King George it is not expected by some of his warmest friends that he will be able to defeat General Lee. Several of the prominent politicians from that district were in the city to-day, and in response to the so-called dissatisfaction replied that it was confined mainly to Stafford and King George. Outside of these counties they said Lee would get the usual democratic vote, as well as a good portion of the republican vote, which Hume would be unable to overcome. Wagers on Lee are offered at even, but find no takers, and his election is thought to be probable.
