every nation of Europe attended, with thousands of diplomats and envoys. The bodies were almost completely covered with flowers. The march from the palace chapel to the Church of St. Vincente, two miles, was between solid files of troops and an immense concourse of people.

During Friday masses were said at the altars in the palace chapel and, according to tradition, priests prayed before the caskets, sprinkled them with holy water and burned incense. The principal mass was celebrated by the papal nuncio. It was attended by King Manuel and Queen Amalia and the members of the diplomatic corps in uniform and the gentlemen and ladies of the court. After the service had ended all those who attended the mass viewed the bodies of the monarch and his son. The public was not admitted to the chapel.

The number of floral tributes received is unprecedented. In every instance two have been sent, one for the hier of King Carlos and the other for that of the crown prince. Added to those that had been sent, the queen ordered every blossom plucked from the famous Cintra gardens, and the inside of the chapel was literally banked in flowers and the floor covered by them to a depth of ten inches. The flowers embraced nearly every variety grown in the kingdom, and the air of the chapel was redolent with their perfumes. Some of the offerings are so large as to require four men to carry them.

Charles Page Bryan, the American minister, sent two wreaths, one to King Manuel, with expressions of the most profound sorrow of President Roosevelt and the American people, and the other to Queen Amalia, conveying the heartfelt regrets of the American nation.

A feature of the day was the arrival of twenty-five priests from different parishes, with their choirs of children. Many persons came from neighboring towns in the provinces for the funeral. The government accepted the presence of so many peaceful provincials as a strong assurance against any disagreeable incident.

Lonely College Girl a Swindler. Chicago, Feb. 8.—Loneliness was given by Miss Estelle Taylor, a university and law school graduate, as her reason for passing a number of worthless checks. She was held for the grand jury. "The utter lack of incentive in my life, and the awful loneliness which depressed me, made me dishonest," she said. "One day I saw a check lying around, and a wild notion to pass it came to me. I did it. The excitement alleviated my loneliness, and I passed others."

"Pauper's" Wealth Revealed by Bath. Newark, N. J., Feb. 8.—Attendants at the city almshouse found \$1160 sewed in the dress of Annie Martin, an aged woman admitted as a pauper. When she arrived at the almshouse she was compelled to take a bath. It was while she was disrobing that the money was found. She must now pay \$2.50 a week for her keep. Her money was taken from her, and she will have only what the authorities give her to spend.

Robbed in a Pullman Car. Jacksonville, Fla., Feb. 8.—While asleep in a Pullman car in the local railroad yards a sneak thief visited the berth of Dr. C. L. Norton, of Adirak, Mich., who is accompanied by his wife and son and robbed him of \$500 in cash and his gold watch.

NEW CURRENCY BILL

Minority Measure Introduced in Congress.

DRAWN BY DEMOCRATS

Deals With Reserve Flow, Elastic Currency and Aims Blow at Stock Gambling—Creates Fund to Pay Depositors of Failed Banks.

Washington, Feb. 8.—What will be known as the "minority currency bill" was introduced by Representative John Sharp Williams (Miss.), the Democratic leader of the house, who drew the measure as a result of a conference of Democrats behind closed doors. Among the provisions of the bill are the following:

It repeals all laws permitting national banks to keep three-fifths of their reserves in national banks of reserve cities, and similar laws permitting such deposit of one-half of the reserve amounts. It provides that not less than one-half of the reserves now required to be kept in lawful money in central reserve cities, shall hereafter be held in gold or gold certificates.

It does away with the payment of national bank examiners by the fee system, and substitutes salaries not less than \$3000 nor in excess of \$5000 yearly, with actual expenses. It provides that the total liabilities of any national bank, inclusive of the liabilities of its members, shall not exceed one-tenth of the bank's paid-in and unimpaired capital stock and one-tenth of its unimpaired surplus fund; and that in no event shall the liabilities exceed 90 per cent. of the capital stock. "But the discount of bills of exchange drawn in good faith against actually existing values, and the discount of commercial or business paper actually owned by the person negotiating it, shall not be considered as liabilities." Violation of this section is made a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment.

No national bank shall loan in the aggregate more than seven times the amount of its paid-up capital, plus its unimpaired surplus. Violation is punishable as provided in the section preceding.

The comptroller of the currency, immediately after the passage of the bill, shall furnish a copy of the new law to each bank in the country and require it to file with the comptroller. Consent shall be binding, and the liabilities attaching to consent may be enforced by the comptroller. Agreement to accept the provisions shall be in writing, and the trust companies to the benefit of the new law.

The elastic currency feature of the bill is contained in a section which provides that inter-convertible bonds may be deposited "in the nearest sub-treasury," and the depositing bank shall receive in lieu thereof "United States emergency treasury notes." These notes shall be in the nature of a loan, subject to a taxation of one-eighth of one per cent for the first four months of their issuance, one-half of one per cent for the second four months, and one per cent thereafter. When the bank feels that the emergency has passed and the loans are no longer needed, it may redeem them with actual money. Such redemption monies shall constitute a special fund for the purpose of redeeming United States emergency currency notes whenever they are presented for payment, the notes to be then cancelled and destroyed. These notes shall be legal tender.

For the creation of a fund of \$15,000,000 for the payment of depositors of failed banks operating under the provisions of this law, there is authorized the imposition of a tax of one-tenth of one per cent on the deposits of banks so operating and whose consent to be so taxed has been obtained.

The final section of the bill provides that no bank officer shall make a loan for the purpose of stock gambling and fines as the penalty for violation a fine in the amount of the loan, or imprisonment.
