

Man's Inhumanity.
 New York, May 4.—The Panama mail to April 24 says: A report has reached here of an almost incredible act of inhumanity on the part of the commander of the American whaler Hope On, which left Panama Bay some time ago for a cruise in the South Pacific. According to the sworn statement of one of the crew he was maltreated by the mate and put in irons. When the vessel reached Juan Fernandez Island (Robinson Crusoe's Island) he was put into a boat and landed at an uninhabited bay, where he was left with a handful of broken biscuits. He finally succeeded in constructing a rude raft, on which he put to sea, and was sighted after some days of suffering by a sloop at anchor in San Juan Bantista Bay and rescued. The sailor's deposition was taken, and formal charges against the Hope On's Captain have been made.

Business Embarrassments.
 PITTSBURG, May 4.—Judgments and notes aggregating \$24,000 have been entered against Wm. McKinney & Son, scrap iron dealers, of Southside. The possessions of the firm are now in the hands of the Sheriff.

ATLANTA, May 4.—M. Franklin, wholesale notions, assigned. Liabilities, \$40,000; assets nominal—\$30,000. Fraud alleged and temporary receiver appointed.

St. ALAANS, Vt., May 4.—St. Albans iron and steel mills filed a petition of insolvency. Liabilities, \$505,000; assets, \$407,000.

Boston, May 4.—Orrin F. Smith, paper manufacturers' agent, of New York, has failed and disappeared. His liabilities are reported at from \$15,000 to \$50,000. His creditors are at work on his books. They show very little if any assets, and the greater part of his indebtedness is to the mills.

A Puncher Punched.

CINCINNATI, O., May 4.—Mortiz Heilburn a prominent Third street merchant, and senior member of the firm of Heilburn, Hellman & Co., wholesale clothing dealers, attended the Dramatic Festival last night and after the performance he bounced Car No. 2, of the Seventh Street Line, and because the driver, William Cafferty, from the Emerald Isle, refused to stop the car before it reached the crossing, he proceeded to assault the conductor.

The conductor showed the infuriated citizen the way to the steps. When the car reached the crossing and while McCafferty's back was turned Heilburn rushed up and struck him several low taps on the back with his cane. Lieutenant Borek and Officer Sam Smallwood happened along about that time and the man was taken in tow. He was arraigned before Judge Van Martels in the Police Court this morning and fined \$10 and costs.

A Very Close Call.

St. Louis, May 4.—There was excitement in the Vulcan Steel Works, Carondelet, yesterday morning, when Patrick Maher was caught by the rollers and whirled around and around. Before the machinery could be stopped he was almost stripped of clothing. It took about fifteen minutes to cut his clothes loose from the rolls. He was taken up for dead, but Dr. Outten was called and said he was not even dangerously hurt—a severe bruise on the head being the only real injury. Maher had been oiling machinery, and had got too near the rollers.


