THE CROP OUTLOOK.

WASHINGTON, May 11 .- May returns of wheat make the condition, compared with the April averages, materially lower in New York, Michigan, Ohio and Illinois. The averages are as follows: For New York, 77; Michigan, 83; Ohio, 62; Illinois, 66. A reduction in Missouri from 88 to 80 is reported. Indiana and New Jersey are the same as in April. All the remaining Northern States show an improvement since the April report, as well as the Pacific coast and nearly all the Southern States. Oregon shows an improvement of 17 points, and California 15. The average conditon of winter wheat is 83} against 80 in April. The spring wheat area reports will not be complete until May 15. Without regard to spring wheat the present prospect for winter wheat area represents a loss of about 75,000,000 bushels.

Sr. PAUL, May 11 .- Manager Hubbard, of the Millers' Association, says threefourths of the seeding in Minnesota and Dakota is done, and the crop is two weeks in advance of last year. There is an increase in the wheat acreage by about 2 per cent., mostly in Dakota.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 11.—S. W. Tal-madge, of the Milwaukee Chamber of Commerce, yesterday obtained the following information relative to the condition of the wheat crop. H. H. Young, Secretary of the Minnesota State Board of Agriculture, says: "The acreage planted and to be sown in this State will not exceed 2,392,-500 acres. The crop is all backward, even that down earliest, and taking the area and condition together, we have no right to expect more than 86 per cent, of a good average crop. I estimate the crop of the State at about 23,500,000 bushels. Farmers in the southern part of the State have largely changed from wheat-growing to dairying and general farming, and in the northern part planting has been greatly delayed. considerable not being sown yet."

Alex. Heron, Secretary of the Indiana State Board, under date of May 9, says: "I have but little change to report in the prospect for the wheat crop in Indiana. The improvement is not so much as was estimated in the April report, and we place the figure a shade lower as to condition. In the southwestern part of the State some good wheat is reported, but as a whole it is very discouraging. The season is at best ten days

Mr. Talmadge has made a new estimate on the crop of 1883, giving the following totals by States: Ohio 26,000,000 bushels; Michigan 23,000,000, Indiana 30,000,000, Illinois 24,000,000, Wisconsin 16,000,000, Minnesota 25,000,000, lowa 22,000,000, Missouri 23,000,000, Kansas 25,000,000. Nebraska 17,000,000, California 29,000,000, Oregon 13,000,000, Pennsylvania 22,000,-000, New York 12,000,000, other States and Territories 95,000,000, making a total of 402,000,000 bushels, against 503,000,000 bushels last year's production.


