The new postal law will be ready for circulation September 3.

Eight thousand weavers in the Ashton-under-Lyne district, England, have struck for higher wages. Their action throws twenty thousand people out of work.

POLK, the defrauding Democratic State Treasurer of Tennessee, goes to the penitentiary for twenty years. Influential connections could not save him in that Democratic State.

The receipts of wheat in Chicago are almost as large as at this time last year, when the crop was much above the average. The conclusion is that the crop is a good deal better than was expected.

Crops in Virginia are suffering for want of rain. In some sections no rain has fallen for six weeks, and corn is burning up. The indications point to a crop far short of last year.

The harvest is over in Kansas, and the yield is in excess of anything ever known before. The corn crop last year was 160,000,000 bushels, and it is estimated that this year's increase will be 25 per cent.

The annual meeting of the Colored Baptist Association of Kentucky was held in Maysville on Sunday, and about three thousand colored persons were in attendance. Considering the large number it was an orderly and well-behaved crowd.

At the election in Utah, under the new Federal law which disfranchises polygamists, the Mormons carried every county, the Gentiles electing a few justices and constables in mining camps. The Legislature will be composed wholly of young Mormons.
