Legislature Uncertain With Chances In Favor of The Democrats.

PROHIBITION DEFEATED.

The Republicans now concede Hoadley's election as Governor by a majority ranging from 3,000 to 5,000. The Legislature is considered uncertain, with the chances in favor of the Democracy.
