Suicide With a Pocket-Knife. SHAWNEE, O., Feb. 29.—Al. Walls, a hostler at Obea's livery stable, committed suicide by cutting his throat with a pocket-knife.

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HYDROPHOBIA CASES.

Death of Two Children in Chicago In Terrible Agony.

Much Alarm Felt Among Parents—How the Disease was Contracted, and of its Progress—Heart-rending Sufferings.

CHICAGO, Feb. 29.—Two well authenticated cases of death resulting from hydrophobia were recorded yesterday, and numerous reports of children having been bitten by dogs are being made to-day tending to alarm parents.

The same dread disease was given as the cause of the late Alfred Stender's death when a burial permit was obtained by his father yesterday.

PARIS, Feb. 29.—The police here are convinced that the advanced Irish party have made Paris their headquarters in Europe for the preparation of dynamite schemes.

The Marshal Harris Murder. CEDARVILLE, O., Feb. 29.—About 100 witnesses have been summoned from this place on the Weymouth murder trial at Xenia.

Supposed to Have Been Murdered. BROOKVILLE, Ind., Feb. 29.—John Malder, a highly respected citizen of Highland Township, aged about seventy years, was found dead near the Gessel burying-ground this morning.

Terrible Tramps. HILLSBORO, Ill., Feb. 29.—This vicinity is overrun with tramps. On Wednesday night fifteen or twenty made a raid on the town, demanding food, clothes and money.

A Postoffice Burglarized. RICH HILL, Mo., Feb. 29.—The Postoffice here was robbed of money and stamps of the denominations of two, four, six and ten cents, amounting in all to about \$94.

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A SINGULAR MARRIAGE.

A Wealthy but Paralyzed New Yorker Marries a Fleeshy Woman in Boston.

BOSTON, Mass., Feb. 29.—Around a table in Fred Evans' lager beer saloon, No. 6 State street, at 1 o'clock to-day, sat a fine-looking old man, probably 60 years of age, a flashily-dressed woman who had just been made his wife, and a dozen or more men who were all drinking free beer furnished in unlimited quantities by the happy, but half paralyzed bridegroom, Col. B. J. Fox.

About noon to-day the certificate was obtained, a Justice of the Peace was sent for, and, in the presence of Mr. Evans, M. J. Leonard and a number of other men, Miss Liverett and Colonel Fox were made one in a slip of the saloon.

By this time the news had reached the street and throngs of men commenced to pour in. The newly married couple sat drinking beer in a stolid, indifferent manner, and all comers had all they wanted at the Colonel's expense.

Marshal Longstreet's Defense. WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—United States Marshal Longstreet (Ga.) continued his testimony before the House Committee on expenditures, and was asked if processes had not been served by an unauthorized Deputy Marshal under him.
