

Mr. EVARTS is being boomed for the New York Senatorship.

The bill to establish a Department of Agriculture has passed the House.

The two houses of Congress have agreed to adjourn on Saturday until January 5th.

The charters of seven hundred and twenty-one national banks will expire during the coming year.

The headquarters of the Kentucky Whisky Exporting Committee will be moved January 1st from Lexington to Cynthiana.

The East Kentucky News, printed at Catlettsburg, has suspended publication. It was removed to that place a few months ago from Grayson, Carter County.

The new Nicaragua treaty that empowers the United States to build a \$60,000,000 canal is said to be in contravention of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, as interpreted by Great Britain.

The House will on January 16th, consider the McPherson bill, to issue to national banking associations circulating notes up to the amount of the par value of bonds deposited for security.

Mr. CARLISLE, in his recent speech at the ratification meeting in Baltimore, said: "The business interest can best be forwarded by being left alone as far as possible from Government interference."

BLAINE'S libel suit against the Indianapolis Sentinel has been dismissed by the plaintiff for the reason that he does not believe he can get justice in Indiana. In a letter to his attorneys he says he would have to contend against "the consolidated venom of the Democratic party."

The case has ended precisely as was predicted.

The Senate has passed the bill to admit the Southern portion of the Territory of Dakota as a State in the Union. The population embraces about three hundred and fifty thousand inhabitants. The vote was a party one, thirty-five Republicans voting for the bill and twenty-eight Democrats against it.

ONE century ago sixty unpretentious Methodist preachers sat upon stiff benches in a little meeting house in Baltimore, and organized a church. Last week 650 delegates, representing 4,000,000 members of that church, are welcomed to that city's hospitality. It is a marvelous growth that the century has witnessed and foreshadows a magnificent increase in the great future of the church.

If a man with a few thousand dollars wants to get rich, let him invest in the mountains of Eastern Kentucky. There, hidden in the wilderness, is an untold wealth of timber, coal, iron and minerals of all kinds. Northern capitalists seem to be more keenly sensible of Kentucky's natural advantages than Kentuckians are themselves.

**Health Rules For Winter.**

[Farm and Fireside.] Never lean with the back upon anything that is cold. Never begin a journey until the breakfast has been eaten. Never take warm drinks and then immediately go out in the cold air. Keep the back—especially between the shoulder blades—well covered; also the chest well protected. In sleeping in a cold room establish the habit of breathing through the nose, and never with the mouth open. Never go to bed with cold or damp feet. Never omit regular bathing, for unless the skin is in active condition the cold will close the pores and favor congestion or other diseases. After exercises of any kind never ride in an open carriage, or near the window of a car for a moment; it is dangerous to health and even to life. When hoarse, speak as little as possible until the hoarseness is recovered from, else the voice may be permanently lost or difficultly to the throat be produced. Merely warm the back by a fire, and never continue keeping the back exposed to heat after it has become warm. To do otherwise is debilitating. When going from a warm atmosphere into a cooler one keep the mouth closed so that the air may be warmed by its passage through the nose ere it reaches the lungs. Never stand still in cold weather, especially after having taken a slight degree of exercise, and always avoid standing on ice or snow, or where the person is exposed to cold wind.

**CONDENSED NEWS.**

The United States Senate passed the bill to admit the southern part of Dakota into the Union. COLONEL MAPLESON, the impresario, has declared his intention to become an American citizen. The National House has agreed to adjourn on Saturday to January 5, and the Senate will probably follow suit. A TRACE has been obtained in the way of discovering the cause of the Lemon Bridge explosion, but it is a faint one. THE Reichstag has rejected Prince Bismarck's proposal for the establishment of an African Consulate General at Cape Town. G. B. THOMPSON and wife, near Lostine, Oregon, went to church, home burned and with it two of their children, aged two and six. In a terrific storm at sea the Thingvalla threw over oil and lay eighteen hours in calm water, while the waves fought the grease in vain.

LENA GREINER, the pretty frau of Andreas Greiner, a hotel-keeper of Pittsburg, ran away with young Peter Hutz and \$300 of Andreas' money. At Cleveland she was captured, while the handsome zither player went on, either to Chicago or Cincinnati.

LACKAWANNA Iron and Coal Company's reservoir, Scranton, Pennsylvania, holding 10,000,000 gallons of water, burst last night, flooding the flats. A rumor that a party of young women were passing by the reservoir and were drowned has not been confirmed.

CHICAGO has 647 divorce cases pending in its courts and the Philadelphia courts have something over 700. The New York Herald has taken the trouble to publish alphabetical lists of the unhappy couples in each case, and the exhibit has created considerable excitement for their great numbers and the persons who are seeking to be released from marital vows.

**Hot at the Mines.**

COLUMBUS, Dec. 18.—The syndicate and coal exchange have received information of an attack made on the guards at Jumper Brothers' mines near Nelsonville, last night between 11 and 12 o'clock. About one hundred and fifty shots were exchanged. None of the guards were injured, and so far as learned those who made the attack escaped the bullets. Complete quiet is reported to-day.

**She Had Enough Tools.**

BANGOR, Me., Dec. 18.—The wife of Plummer Witham, of Verona, attempted suicide by cutting her throat yesterday. The husband, on entering the house, saw a large pool of blood on the floor, and going to the bedroom, found his wife on the bed with a mirror before her about to finish the act which she had partially accomplished in another room. The instruments taken from her consisted of a razor, a butcher knife and a common pocket knife. She had cut an ugly gash in her neck which was sewed up by physicians. She will recover. Jealousy is said to be the cause.

SHREVEVILLE, Ill., Dec. 18.—Harry Tice, a lad of sixteen years, was yesterday lodged in jail, charged with the murder of Newton Ensey, a playmate of his own age, last summer. The boys fell out over some trivial matter and blows followed, when Tice drew a knife and stabbed Ensey. The latter lingered a few days and died. Tice escaped, but returned a few days ago. Both were tightly connected.

**Daring Dick Turpin.**

TORONTO, Ont., Dec. 18.—A number of places have been entered by burglars recently and in each case the burglars left cards with the names "Dick Turpin," "Pistol Pry" and "Boston Bill." Monday night some persons entered Mr. Allan's house, taking jewelry worth \$2,000. They sent a notice to the detectives a month ago they would rob a house on McCall street last night, but the detectives thought nothing of it till Mr. Allan reported yesterday.

**Waltie-McNally Fight.**

BUTTE, Mont., Dec. 18.—The prize fight between Jack Waltie and McNally, which has been talked about for weeks among sporting men from the Rocky Mountains to Boston, came off here yesterday. It was no pillow case fight. The boys poured in from the hills in crowds. Both men were in good condition. Five hot rounds were fought under the Marquis of Queensberry rules. At the end of the fifth round Jack Waltie's party threw up the sponge.

**Excited Georgians.**

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 18.—Two kegs of powder have been found concealed under the Gate City school building. The motive which led to the powder being placed there is unknown. Taken in connection with the incendiary attempt to burn the court-house, it has created considerable sensation.

**Business and Gambling.**

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—Peter McGloch, the well known speculator, was suspended for thirty days by the Directors of the Board of Trade yesterday for pleading in his suits with Daniel Wells over the great land deals that his contracts were gambling transactions and therefore illegal.
