## OUR NAVY.

Extracts of Secretary Whitney's Report to Congress.  
 NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—The Sun, this morning, presents an abstract of Secretary Whitney's report, which has not yet been sent to Congress. It claims that with the exception of two cases Secretary Whitney has practically abandoned the idea of the unprotected torpedo boat, but says that he recommends the continuation of experiments in submarine boats. Proposals for the construction of these boats will be received at the Navy department on March 1. Mr. Whitney is opposed to any further appropriation of money for work on the single turret monitors. The Sun then quotes from the report as follows: A first-class modern ironclad could safely anchor surrounded by a fleet of these monitors without any damage of injury to herself, and any one of her guns could send a projectile through the monitor from stem to stern. It would be little less than murder to send men in these vessels at the present time to encounter any recently built ironclad. I appreciate fully that it is only as a temporary expedient that it is suggested, and with the thought that in the absence of anything else, these might be better than nothing. This has been the theory upon which over \$50,000,000 and probably \$75,000,000 have been spent since the close of the war. It is time to stop it and be content only with the best. If every dollar is made to count upon something of real value waste will stop and not before.  
 He recommends that due attention be given to the subject of pneumatic guns and pneumatic gun carriages. On the subject of naval reserve and coast defense, he says: "The department has formed itself fully of the different systems of organization for coast defense and naval reserves at present in force in foreign countries, and is prepared to formulate a general plan for a similar organization to meet the requirements and conditions of our own institutions. It should resemble in organization that of the militia or National guard, rest upon the foundation of local interest, contemplate the employment and rapid mobilization of steamers enrolled or an auxiliary navy list and be calculated to produce the best results upon a comparatively small National expenditure. I ask for this question the earnest consideration of Congress."  
 The secretary recommends the construction of five new ships as follows: "Two armor-clad vessels to cost exclusive of armament not more than \$5,000,000, one to be built by contract and one in the navy yards, and three more fast cruisers of the highest type." He says that in six years only four of the present cruising ships will remain serviceable, in other words, the old navy will have disappeared, encouragement for torpedo experiment is recommended and suggestion is made that the course in the naval academy be reduced to four years.

## Stock and Crops.

Macey Brothers sold to George Ayres, of New York, a two-year old bay colt, by Ten Broeck, for \$1,000.  
 James and Jacob Hugely, of Madison County, cut off the tails of 48 sheep in October, and all but six have since died.  
 Bramlette & Gibson, of Carlisle, sold 1,200 hogheads of tobacco to the Finzer Brothers, of Louisville, a few days ago at 21 cents, amounting to \$315,000.  
 R. C. Bland, of Washington, shipped twenty-three cattle, averaging one thousand seven hundred pounds, to Cincinnati yesterday on the St. Lawrence.  
 R. P. Pepper, of Frankfort, Ky., has sold to C. N. Dunlap, of Mt. Sterling, Illinois, a Motor, bay colt, foaled 1884, sired by Onward; dam Griselda, by Wm. Ryadyk; second dam by Amos Clay.  
 Since January last Ed Martin, of Brown County, Ohio, has purchased forty-five car-loads of horses at Bloomington, Ill., and twenty-five car-loads from Ohio and Kentucky, at a cost of about \$300,000.  
 The widow Crow, of near Los Angeles, Cal., raised 3,000 acres of wheat last summer, which she sold for \$60,000. When her crop was ripe, she put five combined machines to work which cut, threshed and sacked thirty acres each per day. It took five men to tie the sacks when threshed.

Miss Laura Graham, daughter of Dr. W. B. Graham, living at Wrightsville, Ohio, six miles above Manchester, fell speechless last Tuesday night and died in twenty minutes. Miss Graham seemed to be in good health, ate a hearty supper and assisted in doing up some of the housework for the evening. Heart trouble is supposed to be the cause of her death.

Senator Harris' plan of reducing the salary of the commissioners does not meet the approval of the people of a greater portion of this section of the State."
