MR. AND MRS. JACK ORR ate their first meal in their handsome new residence on East Third street yesterday morning. They moved into it Saturday afternoon, and were surprised that evening by a crowd of their young friends, who dropped in and added to the pleasure and happiness of the first hours in the new home.

W. T. BUCKNER, SR., one of the wealthiest men of Bourbon County and well known as a breeder of Shorthorn cattle, died last Friday at his home near Cane Ridge. He leaves two thousand acres of Bourbon County land, valued at \$100 an acre, and much other valuable property to his two grandchildren—children of his only son, W. T. Buckner, Jr. He was worth about \$300,000.

GILMAN & BRENT, of Paris, have slaughtered and shipped to New York and Boston this year about 20,000 turkeys, for which they paid 63 cents per pound on foot—equal to about \$15,000. They shipped from Richmond eight thousand head and from Newport five thousand. W. J. Ranson shipped from Paris 75,000 pounds, and paid an average price of 7 1/2 cents per pound dressed.

A SPECIAL from Paris says John R. Barbee, of Bourbon County, has shipped to England a turkey gobbler weighing forty-five pounds and a turkey hen weighing twenty-two pounds. He received \$150, which is probably the highest price ever paid for a pair of turkeys. This is the largest gobbler ever sent from Kentucky, with the exception of one raised by Beverly W. Dorsey, of the same county, which weighed fifty-two pounds and was shipped to Georgia.

LEWIS CIRCUIT COURT.

A Short Term—Fines Assessed, Indictments Reported and other Business Transacted.

The Lewis Circuit Court adjourned Saturday afternoon, and Judge Cole and Commonwealth's Attorney Salles returned home that night. The court was in session only a week, and the term was one of the shortest ever held at Vanceburg. The fines assessed amounted to about \$250, one of \$50 for selling liquor to a minor, and one or two of \$50 each against some of the railroad contractors up that way for selling "Camomile Bitters," proved to be a very poor quality of whisky. Wm. Huffman was convicted of stealing a skiff, and sentenced to the penitentiary for one year. Another party was sentenced to ten days in jail at hard labor for disturbing religious worship about two years ago. Several other parties were sentenced to short terms of imprisonment in the county jail for misdemeanors.

Elijah Ingalls was indicted for the murder of Wm. Mayfield, his father-in-law. The crime was committed some time last summer. Ingalls was arrested at Portsmouth Saturday, and has been brought to Vanceburg for trial. His friends at Portsmouth tried to have him released on a writ of habeas corpus, but did not succeed.

Among the indictments reported were three against the Maysville & Big Sandy Railroad Company for a public nuisance. The nuisance complained of consisted in destroying or damaging public highways, without providing a suitable road in place thereof.

The Vanceburg, Concord & Tollesboro, Turnpike Company was indicted for allowing its road to get out of repair. This company composed largely of Maysville people.

The building was owned by the Collins & Rudy Lumber Company. The damage amounts to about \$500.


