The Committees of the Northern and Southern General Assemblies of the Presbyterian Church of America, appointed at the last annual sessions to confer upon the subject of organic union and issues dividing the two branches of the church, have adjourned their meeting at Louisville, without agreeing upon anything definite.

MAYSVILLE is not the only place where the gas question has caused trouble. The condition of affairs at Xenia, O., may be judged from the following special sent on the 16th instant:

A very exciting City Council meeting occurred to-night, during which the gas company was awarded the contract for lighting the city and furnishing gas to private consumers at \$2 per thousand for ten years.

Stock and Crops.

R. W. Givens & Son, of Danville, sold 41 extra fat mules at an average price of nearly \$125 per head.

Messenger Chief, the noted trotting stallion, died at Versailles last week. He was valued at \$20,000.

In the past ten days or so, Brown, Bramlette & Co., of Carlisle, have bought 100,000 pounds of tobacco to be delivered at Mt. Olivet.

E. K. Thomas, of Bourbon, sold 61 mules last week to Joseph Finley, of Georgetown, for Tennessee parties at \$107 per head.

Twenty-five thousand turkeys of the value of \$16,500 have been shipped from Clark County this fall. Dealers say the turkeys from Central Kentucky are the largest brought to the eastern markets.

Mr. J. A. Powers has contracted with Milton Taylor to take all the tobacco he raises next year at nine cents per pound. Mr. Taylor expects to raise about forty thousand pounds.—Bracken Chronicle.

Bradstreet's predicts a cotton crop of 6,480,000 bale, or about 180,000 bales more than the last estimate of the Agricultural Department. Even if the crop should be 6,500,000, the consumptive requirements of the world would probably readily absorb it at good prices.

James Boyd and T. C. Westfall made a purchase of 40 hhds. of tobacco on the Cincinnati "breaks" last week. This tobacco is being rehandled at Dover, and the gentlemen expect to place it on the market in a short time and realize a handsome profit.—Dover News.

At Lexington last Thursday thirty-two head of horses belonging to Congressman Scott sold for \$54,725. Ten head of G. M. Rye, for \$10,925. Four head of P. Mack for \$9,400. Five other head belonging to different owners sold for \$4,755. The fifty-one head sold for \$79,025, or an average of \$1,500.
