## AN UNKNOWN'S FATE.

His Remains Found Scattered Along the Railroad—Head, Arms and Legs Out Off.

Early this morning some C. and O. section men, while going to their day's labor, were greeted by a horrible sight at a point near Mr. Thornton Cox's home, one mile west of Springdale.

The remains of some poor unfortunate man were found scattered along the track. His head, arms and legs had been cut off and were lying here and there on the ties and at the side of the road, together with shreds of clothing and the shapeless body that had been crushed into a pulpy mass, entirely beyond recognition. It was a sickening sight.

From some papers that were found it is thought he was a Mr. Stubblefield. Several trains had evidently passed over the body during the night.

Whether he met death under the wheels, or was killed and placed on the rails is unknown, and the mystery will likely remain unsolved.

It is reported also that another man was run over and killed near Sand Hill last night.
