THE building association stockholders will have to pay taxes hereafter on the amount of their shares paid in, where they are not borrowers from the associations. County Assessor Everett is not left any choice in the matter. This is in line with the rulings of the Board of Equalization last spring.

MR. H. R. DOBYNS, of Kansas City, was in town this morning. He formerly resided in Maysville, and is here on a visit to relatives and friends in this city and county. Speaking of the political outlook he says the Democrats will make big inroads on the Republican majority in Kansas at the approaching election. The people are opposed to the high tariff.

THE iron work of the new bridge over the Ohio river, connecting Newport and Cincinnati, is passing here daily over the C. and O. railroad. The caisson for the pier on the Ohio side of the river will be sunk as soon as the fifteen-foot rise goes down. It is a monster, and it will be necessary to float it across on rafts, or otherwise it would sink with its own weight.

THERE are now eleven banks in Lexington with a capital of nearly \$5,000,000, besides two safety vault and trust companies and several building and loan associations handling several thousand dollars in loans. It is claimed Lexington has more banking capital than any other city of its size in the United States, and there are ten towns within fifteen miles of Lexington having from two to three banks each. But there isn't a city in the State, outside of Louisville, whose banks can make a better showing than Maysville's.

SOME of the public schools of Lexington have been dismissed, because the authorities have failed to provide for warming the buildings. A fine state of affairs for such a place.

IN the County Court yesterday Thomas A. Keith was appointed administrator of the late D. A. Richardson, and qualified with Thomas Wells, Chas. B. Pearce and Mrs. L. M. Keith as sureties. Thomas Wells, W. W. Fall and Charles B. Pearce were appointed appraisers of the estate.
