

POLITICS IN IRELAND

Yesterday a Day of Intense Excitement.

FREE FIGHTS INDULGED IN.

Meetings Broken Up by Mobs Armed With Blackthorns and Stones—A Number of People Severely Injured—The Police Called On at Several Places to Quiet the Disturbances—Other Foreign News.

Sligo, March 30.—At 8 o'clock Sunday morning the streets were alive with music. The bishop and priests denounced Parnell from the altar. Parnell took an excursion to Strandhill, where he began a personal canvass, but meeting with a hostile reception, he returned to Sligo.

Maurice Healy, Sexton, Davitt and Colley started at 9 o'clock in the morning for Tireagh, addressing small gatherings until they reached Templeboy. There the people formed into two hostile groups. The Parnellites, armed with blackthorns, moved against the Healyites with the intention of attacking them, but the police interposed with fixed bayonets and the storm subsided. At Dromore west the Parnellites stoned their opponents, and the police made a charge with clubs on the Parnellites. Then Davitt led his followers off the ground amid a fusillade of stones. Several anti-Parnellites were injured, and Finkerton, member of parliament, had his head cut.

At Esker the anti-Parnellite speakers found the Parnellites barring the road and by advice of the police, retreated to Sligo.

In the evening a meeting of anti-Parnellites was held at Sligo, when the speakers charged that the mob had acted under instructions of the Parnell leaders.

A telegram from Pallina states that Dr. Tanner was seriously assaulted there by a Parnellite mob.

Bulgarian Assassination.

SOFIA, March 30.—The police are actively investigating the assassination of M. Baitcheff. Thirty persons have been arrested. The prisoners include M. Karaveloff. All the persons taken into custody are members of the party which M. Karaveloff represents.

Details of the murder show that, as is customary, a gendarme followed MM. Baitcheff and Stambouloff on their walk. Coming to a dark portion of the road the gendarme noticed four strangers who were following the ministers and acting in a rather suspicious manner. Almost as soon as they were seen the strangers began firing. Their bullets missed M. Stambouloff, who had felt a little in the rear of M. Baitcheff, and had a very narrow escape. M. Baitcheff was struck in the breast by two bullets. He only uttered two cries before he died.

The gendarme at once fired at the assassins, but missed his mark. He then rushed at one of the men and cut him on the shoulder with his sword, but failed to disable him, and the four strangers escaped in the darkness.

Among the prisoners taken into custody to-day is a Greek, who recently purchased a revolver here, and who, it is thought, is the man who fired the fatal shots.

The Svoboda echoes the universal opinion when it says: "There is no doubt that the assault was an attempt of a paid assassin upon the life of M. Stambouloff, and that M. Baitcheff was an innocent victim. We see therein the hand of Russian diplomacy."

Germany Preparing for War.

LONDON, March 30.—Advices from Berlin state that unusual activity has prevailed for the past three days in the war office and that an unusual number of employes are busy at the office. The emperor had a long audience with Chancellor Caprivi yesterday and the high officials general look as if something was on the tapis. There is no doubt that the movements of Russian troops near the German frontier and the evidence of cordial intimacy between Russia and France have caused much anxiety in Berlin, and it is possible that the alarm caused by the apprehension of war may lead to important military changes. Beside the thought that Russia and France may be preparing for war, the German government is said to be very much stirred up over startling facts that have been disclosed in regard to the socialistic propaganda in the army.

Austrian Franchise.

LONDON, March 30.—A Vienna correspondent, commenting upon the wisdom of extending the franchise in Austria says that the members of the reichsrath are practically returned by about 2 per cent of the population. Only seven persons in every hundred possess the right of voting, and but a little over 30 per cent of these go to the polls, the great land owners controlling the votes of the country districts.

The Germans Will Be With Us.

BERLIN, March 30.—The Berlin committee on the Chicago world's fair held its first meeting Saturday. Many of the most prominent merchants and officials of the city were present, and much interest was shown in having Germany, and particularly Berlin, well represented at the great exposition. Sufficient financial support was pledged for having German industries well represented.

Hungarian Crops.

VIENNA, March 30.—The official report of the Hungarian autumn crop, just issued, shows that the wheat crop is in the best of condition, while rye is greatly damaged, and the condition of barley is only fair.

Dam Expected to Break.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 30.—News has reached here that the great dam on the Rideau canal, about ten miles from Ottawa, may break at any moment. Large gangs of men are working to prevent the disaster, which would follow if the great volume of water was released. Houses along the course of the dam have been vacated, as they are certain to be swept away if the water once starts. Many people have left the city to volunteer their services when it may be required.
