

## A CRAZY RAFTSMAN.

### He Attempts to Kill a Dentist at Sherburne—Afterwards Sent to the Asylum

Samuel Hayden, of Morehead, a raftsman who had made his way down the Licking to Sherburne last Friday evening, got off the raft there, presumably to have a tooth extracted. On his way up the bank he saw a large snake and killing it, cut it in three pieces with his knife and drew the blade between his lips. He then made his way to Dr. T. B. Vice's dental office and told him he was suffering from the toothache.

The doctor requested him to get in the chair, and taking a pair of forceps endeavored to extract the aching tooth. He made a hard pull at it but failed. He turned his back to the patient for an instant looking for another instrument, and while in this position the now infuriated man jumped from the chair and made an attempt to shoot the doctor. The latter, however, had in the meantime turned just as Hayden was leveling his pistol, and, seizing him by the wrists, he prevented him from shooting.

A gentleman who happened to be near by went to the doctor's assistance, and the two securely bound Hayden and conveyed him to the jail at Flemingsburg. Saturday the man was tried on a writ of lunacy and was sent to the asylum at Lexington.

Hayden is about twenty-five years old. His father was sent to the asylum about a month ago.

### A Curiosity.

Richard Page, colored, was tried before Squire Grant yesterday afternoon on a charge of committing a rape upon Minnie Smith. He was held over to the Circuit Court, and, in default of \$1,000 bail, was committed to jail. The evidence is very strong against him. He is about twenty-six years old, and has done time in the "pen," having been sent up from Ashland.

The assault on Minnie Smith was committed last Friday at her home in the Fifth ward. As soon as she freed herself from him she got a pistol and attempted to shoot him, but he escaped. Her sister was in the house at the time, and their cries were heard by some neighbors. She got acquainted with Page the day before. She is eighteen years of age, and the family are regarded as among the best colored people of this city.

### BROWN COUNTY PLATS.

Surveyors Restoring Those Destroyed in the Georgetown Court House.

Civil Engineers C. H. Gore and Isaac Bower will be in Aberdeen this week to resurvey that town and make a new plat of it. This was rendered necessary by the fire four or five years ago in the court house at Georgetown. In that fire the plats of the various towns in the county were either destroyed or rendered practically useless, and the work of making new plats is now in progress.

Messrs. Gore and Bower were six weeks making a resurvey and new plat of Higginsport. A special from there states that Mr. Gore estimates the cost to the county for making the plats at \$10,000, if Ripley, Aberdeen, Hamersville and Georgetown are found in as bad condition as that place.

### She Will Address the Women of Maysville Soon in the Interest of the Columbian Exposition.

A letter has been received in Maysville from Mrs. Mary Cecil Cantrill, the Kentucky Member of the Ladies' Board of Managers of the Columbian Exposition. Mrs. Cantrill is anxious that the women of Kentucky should do something worthy of themselves at the World's Fair. The women of other States are already organizing and at work. Mrs. Cantrill feels that the time for awakening enthusiasm is but short and she is willing to lend her best efforts to attain that end.

The women of America lead in the march towards enlightenment and equality, and they will never have a better opportunity to show the Nations of the world what women can do under favorable conditions, than at the World's Fair.

Several points have been selected at which Mrs. Cantrill will address the women of Kentucky. Maysville is one of these points, and it is to be hoped a large audience from town and county will greet her here. She comes of a prominent family in Central Kentucky, is the wife of a former Lieutenant-Governor of our State—the Hon. James E. Cantrill—and is a lady of position and great influence in Georgetown, where she resides.
