

THE NEW F. F. V. LIMITED.

***Additional Information Concerning the C. and O.'s Pet Train, the Fast Flyer.**

The BULLETIN has already told its readers something of the C. and O.'s pet train, the new F. F. V. limited, put on Sunday when there were several important changes in the schedule.

The new train consists of composite car, elegant day coach, with smoking compartment, dining car, Pullman sleeping cars of the latest and most improved design, and an observation car. Emphasis is especially placed on the observation car. It was built by the Pullman company from C. and O. plans. The F. F. V. observation car serve their purpose better than any others that have ever been constructed.

As the F. F. V. limited is the only train having an observation car attached, it necessarily follows that the C. and O. alone has scenery interesting enough to demand an observation car.

The F. F. V. limited is the only train running through from Cincinnati to New York that enables the business man to transact business in Cincinnati one day and New York the next. It is the only train that enables the business man to transact business in Cincinnati one day and reach Washington for breakfast the next morning. It is the only train for Jersey City coast resorts, which are reached by the F. F. V. at dinner time instead of in the evening. It is the most desirable train for New England resorts, connection being made in the Union Depot in Washington with the Colonial express running through to Boston, which reaches New Haven 4:10 p. m., New London 5:30 p. m., Providence 7:15 p. m., and Boston 8:30 p. m. The F. F. V. is the only modern train lighted throughout with electricity, carrying a dining car and an observation car.

The Washington and Atlantic express, also an electric lighted vestibuled train, leaves Cincinnati at 7 p. m., reaching Washington 2:40 p. m. and Old Point Comfort 6 p. m. next day. Connection is made at Washington with the Boston express or the limited, reaching New York about 9 p. m. At Norfolk connection is made with the Old Dominion Steamship Line, reaching New York at 3 p. m. the next day.

Collecting Debts By Postal Cards.
Bourbon News: "The Postmaster General has given an opinion on the matter of endeavoring to collect debts by the sending of postal cards, which is certain to be one of interest to every business man. Two postal cards were submitted to him. On one was written: 'Please call and settle account, which is long past due and for which our collector has called several times, and oblige.' The other contained these words: 'You owe us \$1.80. We have called several times for you. If not paid at once we shall place with our law agency for collection.' The Postmaster General, on the decision of an eminent judge, stated that the first card was mailable and that the second was not. The logic of this decision is that when a threat, direct or implied, is written upon a postal card, the card is unmailable."

THE FARMERS' MUTUAL AID.

Annual Meeting of the Association. Officers Re-Elected—A Good Record.

The annual meeting of the Farmers' Mutual Aid Association of Mason County was held Monday at the court house. The old Board of Directors were re-elected, except Mr. R. B. Case, in Maysville precinct No. 1, who resigned, and Mr. Joseph Cochran was chosen in his place.

The President, Mr. J. B. Key, was re-elected and Mr. J. E. Cahill was also re-elected Secretary.

The association now has 552 members, an increase of thirty-three in the last year. The amount of insurance now in force is \$732,214. The association is in better condition than ever before and is improving steadily.

During the fifteen years the association has been in existence thirty-two assessments have been made, amounting in all to \$5.26 on the \$100, an average of 35 1-15 cents a year on the \$100.

Last year's business of the association shows that three assessments were made during the twelve months, of 10 cents each, making 30 cents on \$100 for the year. There was in the treasury at beginning of year last May, \$110.84. On the three assessments there was collected \$2,273. During the year the association paid out \$1,810.87 in losses. All claims against the company are paid and there is a balance in treasury of \$323.

The Secretary's salary was reduced from \$250 to \$200 a year. The President was allowed \$3 a day for his service, for the time he is actually engaged in business for the company.

A SERIOUS CHARGE.

Lydia Dudley Accused of Aiding and Assisting Prisoners to Escape From the Jail.

Brief mention was made yesterday of the discovery by Jailor Kirk of the fact that some of the prisoners were planning to make a break for liberty.

They had filed in two one steel bar opening from a cell into the side corridor, and had made a good start on another bar. Edward Jones, a horse thief, and William Logan and Milo Allansworth, charged with grand larceny, were the only prisoners who had access to the cell where the work was done. Just where and how they got a file or saw was a mystery for a time, but it is no longer a mystery, if the charges preferred against Lydia Dudley should be substantiated.

The Duley woman was arrested during the afternoon by Constable Dawson on a warrant charging her with aiding and assisting Allansworth and other prisoners to escape from the jail. She was taken before Squire Grant, and the examining trial was set for 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. She was released on \$600 bail.

Constable Dawson claims to have proof that the accused bought the files at the Owens Hardware Company's store, and passed them in to the prisoners by John Berry, colored. Berry is serving a sentence for petit larceny and is a "trusty." He admits that he took the files to the prisoners.
