**The Kentucky Conference Adjourns
List of Appointments For the
Ensuing Year.**

The seventy-fifth annual session of the Kentucky Conference of the M. E. Church, South, closed at Winchester Tuesday afternoon. Bishop Haygood presided, and the attendance was the largest in the history of the body.

Reports showed a gratifying increase in membership and contributions to the various funds. About half of the \$10,000 needed to complete and equip Kentucky Wesleyan College according to original plans was raised at a special meeting for the purpose. A communication came from Cincinnati offering the use of a \$20,000 hotel at Point Burnside free for five years for educational purposes, with the option of purchasing it at the end of that period for \$5,000.

The next conference will meet at Somerset in September, 1896.
