Full Text of His Letter Accepting the Nomination For Re-election.

MAYSVILLE, Ky., April 12th, '97. Hugh S. Young, Secretary, Brooksville, Ky.—Dear Sir: Your letter of the 7th, informing me officially that I had been unanimously nominated by the Democratic convention held at Vanceburg, Ky., April 7th, 1897, for Commonwealth's Attorney for this 19th Judicial District received. I gratefully accept the nomination, fully appreciating the distinguished honor conferred upon me, as well as the responsibility. I hereby extend my sincere thanks to the delegates and officers of the convention and the Democrats throughout the district for the high compliment of another endorsement for this important trust. The nomination was wholly unsolicited by me and therefore the more valued, and since the party has heretofore nominated me for the same position upon my own seeking, I do not now feel that it would be right to refuse when the nomination is tendered voluntarily and by acclamation.

VERSAILES, Ky., April 15.—The commissioners appointed to appraise the value of the turnpike roads condemned by the County Court made additional reports to-day. The Lexington and Frankfort Turnpike Extension Company, six and one-fourth miles in length, was valued at \$1 for the whole. One dollar each was also fixed as the value of the Mortonville and Lexington Extension turnpike, three miles, and the Versailles and Military turnpike, three miles.


