FROM SWITCHMAN UP.

J. T. Harahan, a Prominent Railroader, Has Worked His Way to the Front.

J. T. Harahan, Second Vice President of the Illinois Central, and who was at one time General Manager of the Cheapeake and Ohio road, is said to be in closer touch with employees of the operating department than any big railroad official in the United States.

Mr. Harahan, who has been railroading for thirty years, came up from the ranks, having commenced his career as a switchman. He served time in the shops, and has been an engineer, conductor, roadmaster and yardmaster. His first important position in the operating department was that of Division Superintendent of the Louisville and Nashville, which he took about nineteen years ago.

Five years later he was filling the position of General Manager of the L. and N. Later, he went with the Lake Shore as Assistant General Manager. Along about 1883 he went with the C. and O. as General Manager, and laid out and planned several C. and O. yards and improvements, being one of the best track men in the country. For the past seven or eight years he has filled his present position with the Illinois Central.

Mr. Harahan is well known in this city, being a brother-in-law of the Messrs. Kehoe.
